FORTY-FIFTH CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, 21.—Voorhees introduced a bill authorizing and requiring the Secretary of the Treasury to re-issue the United States legal tender notes now held for redemption, fractional currency, and other such notes heretofore retired from circulation under the act of January 14th, in the aggregate amount of \$25,000,000.

When last heard from, the Zulus were preparing a grand combined attack with all their forces. The Zulu war was thrilling anxiety throughout the colony, especially as the Zulu king was sending emissaries to other native powers urging them not to lose this opportunity.

understood that this does not create voters, it simply forbids race distinctions being connected with the suffrage. The United States declare who shall be citizens, the States provide who shall be voters. Citizenship does not imply the suffrage, else women would be voters all over the United States on the same terms as men, for a woman is a citizen just as much as a man.

The United States have created several classes of citizens, but have passed no law prescribing the qualifications of voters, because the Constitution does not belong to Congress, but to the State Legislatures. The Fourteenth Amendment does not create voters. It simply removes a disability. It does not touch the property qualification imposed by the New York statute, but only wipes out the color line.

We are as much in favor of woman suffrage as its lady advocates, and must say we have never heard of a woman who has been excluded from the ballot under American institutions. But we think the views of some of its supporters only weaken their cause, and that errors will never strengthen any system or give weight to any plea that may be advanced, no matter how able and brilliant may be the advocates.

And we consider it important that the Constitutional right of the People to frame their own local laws in relation to the elective franchise should be generally understood and everywhere maintained, for there is a growing tendency to centralize power in this government, to concentrate in the hands of a few the rights and privileges of the multitude; to increase the national and lessen the local authority, and give to the Federal Government that which of right belongs to the States.

LONDON, 21.—At a meeting of the Murray dock and harbor committee yesterday, it was decided to spend \$35,000 in erecting slaughter sheds necessary to the continuance of the American cattle trade.
