DEATH OF MRS. E. A. JOST.

Estimated Lady Passes Away Very Suddenly From Stomach Trouble.

Answer and Cross Complaint in Barford Sensational Divorce Suit—Sent to Asylum.

One of Ogden's most highly respected ladies, Mrs. Elizabeth A. Jost, wife of Samuel Jost, died at the family residence on the corner of Jefferson avenue and Twenty-second street yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock from stomach trouble from which she has suffered for several years. But the end was nevertheless not unexpected so soon by her loved ones, as her condition was not considered serious, and she had been for some time, and her sudden demise brought great grief and sorrow not only to her family but to her numerous friends.

Mrs. Jost was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Baker, who was born in London, England, April 20, 1842, and came to Utah with her parents in 1852, and has made Ogden her home. She was first married to Alvin A. West, who was a well-known citizen of Ogden, and was the mother of four children, Louis, Miss Lila Jost and Samuel Jost. Mrs. Jost was an affectionate wife, a devoted mother and a woman who enjoyed mother and home life with whom she became acquainted because of her kind, lovable nature.

The date of funeral has not been decided upon but will be announced later.

EVANSTON, WYOMING.

Weather Unusually Favorable—Death of Samuel Gauf.

Evanston, Wyo., Dec. 2.—Favorable weather has permitted operations to be continued in the oil fields of this section much longer than was expected. Oil men that have drilled rigs in position are hastening the work of sinking the drills with all possible speed, while outfits that have ordered rigs and machinery are either getting their outfits in place or making ready for their arrival, so that when winter does set in everything will be in shape to continue operations throughout the year.

There are now fifteen rigs on the ground and en route. Of these the International Oil company has one, the Wyoming Petroleum company one, the Piedmont company one, Mr. Anderson two, Senator Clark two, while others have been ordered. The machinery for the International Oil company, the concern in which Senator Kearns, Senator Clark, Messrs. Perry Heath, Elkins and other prominent and wealthy men are interested, is now on the ground, having been shipped to Cumberland. The derrick is in place and haside of ten days the drill will have tapped the ground.

The Paraffine oil company, of Fossil, has suspended operations for the winter. A depth of several hundred feet was attained and several strains of oil-bearing sand were encountered. Work will be resumed early in the spring.

The Fossil Consolidated Oil company is now putting down casing, but will resume sinking in a few days. It was in the well of this company that a steady flow of oil was struck one day last month at a depth of 500 feet and which caused a rush to the scene. The owners will sink the drill to a depth of 1,200 feet, at which depth it is expected that a gushing well will be secured. The oil is an excellent illuminating article and if a heavy flow of it is encountered a fortune awaits the holders of stock in the concern.

DEATH OF SAMUEL GAUF.

Samuel Gauf, one of the pioneers of Exanston, is dead at the age of 63 years. Deceased came to Exanston from Ohio and during his twenty years residence here he was prominently identified in business and public affairs.
