EVANSTON, WYOMING. ACTIVITY IN OIL FIELDS.

Weather Unusually Favorable Death of Samuel Gauf.

Special Correspondence. Evanston, Wyo., Dec. 2.—Favorable weather has permitted operations to be continued in the oil fields of this section much longer than was expected. Oil men that have drilling rigs in posi-tion are hastening the work of sliking outfits that have ordered rigs and ma-chinery are either getting their outfits in place or making ready for their arrival, so that when winter does set in

everything will be in shape to continue operations throughout the year.

There are now fifteen rigs on the ground and en route. Of these the Intermountain Oil company has one, the wyoming lliuminating Oil company one, Mr. Sandercock one, Fossil Con-solidated company one, Wyoming Par-affine company one, Pledmont company one, Mr. Anderson two, Senator Clark

two, while others have been ordered.

The machinery for the Intermountain Oil company, the concern in which Senator Kearns, Senator Clark, Messrs Perry Heath, Elkins and other prominent and wealthy men are interested, is now on the ground, having been shipped to Cumberland. The derrick is in place and hiside of ten days the drill will

have tapped the ground. The Parassine Oil company, of Fossil, has suspended operations for the winter. A depth of several hundred feet was attained and several strains of ollbearing sand were encountered.

The Fossil Consolidated Oil company is now putting down casing, but will resume sinking in a few days. It was in the well of this company that a steady flow of oil was struck one day last month at a depth of 510 feet and which caused a ruch to the scene. The owners will sink the drill to a depth of 1,200 feet, at which depth it is expected that a gushing well will be secured. The oil is an excellent illuminating ar-ticle and if a heavy flow of it is en-countered a fortune awaits the holders of stock in the concern.
