

LITTLE GIRL'S FRIGHTFUL FATE.

Fillmore, Utah, March 17.—The little three-year-old girl of Frank Brunson was horribly burned last evening by falling in a bonfire that had been kindled by some small boys. It is not positively known just how the accident

occurred, but the children were playing around the fire when the little girl fell in. The boys made an effort to extinguish the flames, but in vain, and before any assistance could be procured the child was unconscious. It is feared that the accident will prove fatal.

THE SUN, MOON AND STARS

Illustrated Lecture by Dr. J. E. Talmage at the Approaching Conference.

To be given in the Tabernacle on the Evening of April 6—Magnificent Motion Pictures.

There will be delivered in the Tabernacle on the evening of Friday, April 6, an illustrated lecture by Dr. James E. Talmage, on the subject, "The Sun, Moon and Stars." That this announcement will be gratifying to Salt Lake City residents and to Conference visitors, will be generally acknowledged. Dr. Talmage's reputation and fame as a lecturer are by no means confined to the limits of the State; and that his ability is appreciated here at home is proved by the large and enthusiastic audiences which greet his every appearance on the platform. The subject announced for the evening of the first day of the coming conference is one in which all intelligent and truth-loving people are interested, and one that has a special fascination for the Latter-day Saints.

The lecture will be illustrated by means of a large collection of pictures, many of them telescopic photographs of the heavenly bodies, other beautifully colored reproductions of pictures drawn by the most eminent astronomers, and numerous moving scenes, showing the majestic march of the eternal worlds in space. The illustrations are pronounced by competent observers who have examined them as among the best demonstrations of astronomical wonders ever shown. A powerful electric stereoscope will be used in projecting the pictures on a mammoth screen; and the illustrative part of the lecture will be on a scale of magnificence rarely equalled anywhere, and never before reached in this State. Utah is particularly favored in having such a building as the great Tabernacle for public lectures such as the one here announced. With an auditorium of unexcelled convenience, an enormous seating capacity, powerful electric currents for illumination and projection, and lecturers of acknowledged ability and of wide reputation, there is every reason for believing that these Tabernacle lectures will command general attention.

Dr. Talmage's lecture on the heavenly bodies will be given under Deseret Museum auspices, and a nominal admission fee of ten cents will be charged. The purpose of the undertaking is not alone that of raising a small revenue for a worthy cause, but also that instruction may be imparted, and the spread of truth facilitated. The occasion will be regarded as a special treat to the many who reside in distant parts, and who are not privileged to enjoy the many public advantages incident to the larger cities, and to all it will surely be welcome.

ARREST OF W. H. PALMER.

Married Man to be Tried for Having Committed Adultery.

Sheriff Howells went to Park City today to get W. H. Palmer, wanted here for adultery. The complaining witness is Ella Alexander, who alleges that the crime was committed in this city in June, 1899, resulting in the birth of twins a week ago today. One of the little ones died the following day.

Palmer is a married man engaged in the photographic business at Park City. The report of the death of the infant was filed in the health office Monday. The father's name was given as W. H. Palmer, residing at 123 West Third South street.

Palmer will be given a hearing before Justice Nelson.

Tom Hurley and Jack Shepard, who made their escape from Sheriff Lindsay of Summit county, have been convicted of burglary at Lansing, Kansas, and sentenced each to eight years' imprisonment.

The men were arrested here six months ago by the sheriff's officers for burglary committed in Park City. Sheriff Howells turned them over to the Summit county officials, but they afterwards escaped from the jail at Coalville.

BRODIE IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

Deputy Sheriff Douse Discovers More Things at Prisoner's House.

William Brodie, an old offender whose arrest was chronicled in yesterday's "News," will be required to stand trial on the charge of stealing a quantity of pelts and hides valued at \$10, from the Salt Lake meat company's place in North Salt Lake. Brodie was discovered by Deputy Sheriff Douse yesterday trying to dispose of the hides to the Halthusen Mercantile company.

Deputy Douse went out to Davis county last evening, and in a house where Brodie lived found a lot of things believed to have been stolen.

NAVAL DISTINCTIONS.

Difference Between Ships of War Mentioned in Dispatches.

A battleship is an armored vessel of comparatively low speed, carrying heavy guns, and intended to fight with other vessels of her class. A cruiser is a swift vessel, sometimes armored, sometimes not, carrying guns of a medium size, intended to act as a scout and to destroy and run away. It occupies to the battleship the same relation that cavalry does to artillery and infantry in an army. An armored cruiser carries armor over its vital parts—machinery. A protected cruiser has a protective deck and very light armor. An unprotected warship has neither armor nor protective deck. A torpedo boat is a very swift unarmored vessel, carrying light guns, whose offensive arm is the torpedo. The torpedo boat destroyer is simply a larger and swifter torpedo boat. The largest war vessels afloat are of 14,000 tons displacement. Ships have been built that have defied any storm they have met, but it is conceivable that a storm might rage that would destroy any vessel. The best coal procurable is used on war vessels. No particular kind has the call.
