No juror can be legally questioned as to his membership in a church, nor as to his acceptance or rejection of a tenet of faith. Neither can he be required to express his willingness or unwillingness to obey a law of God, or to take any other oath than that provided for in the new law for voters, jurors and office-holders. No juror can be, compelled to answer such these we copied ffrom the examination of much and sustained in the Third District Court on Monday. They need not have been answered, pro or con.

The jurors were ready and willing to take the oath provided for by law, but not the eath isbricated by Mr. Dickinquisition. Every juror rejected for his unwillingness to take any other oath than that required by law was unlawfully excluded from the paner, and this cannot be successfully were put to "Mormon" jurors on Monday, let it be cited and we will admit our error. #### MARITAL RIGHTS IN OHIO.

THE bill establishing the property rights of married women, which became a law in Ohio on the 19th of March, has already been commented upon in these columns. Married women have enjoyed similar rights las to holding property in Utah ever since 1872. Ohio is ahead of several of the States but following in the wake of solitary precedent or a single respect- this Territory in that particular. There are some previsions in the Ohio act that are not common in statutory law and are worthy of consideration. We desires the Utah Commissioners to therefore append here a number of

"Sec. 8109. The husband is the head of the family. He may choose any reasonable place or mode of living, and the wife must conform thereto.

"Sec. 3110. The husband must support himself, his wife and his minor children out of his property or by his labor. If he is unable to do so, the wife must assist him so far as she is able.

Sec. 3111. Neither husband nor wife has any interest in the property of the other, except as mentioned in Sec-tions 3110 and 4188, but neither can be excluded from the other's dwelling. "Sec. 3112. A husband or wife may enter into any engagement or transac-tion with the other, or with any other person, which either might if unmar-ried; subject, in transactions between themselves, to the general rules which control the actions of persons occupy-ing confidential relations with each

otherwise eligible to vote from the polls on account of any opinion such person may entertain on the subject of bigamy or polygamy, nor shall they refuse to count any such vote on account of the opinion of the person casting it on the subject of bigamy or polygamy."

#### ELECTRICITY AND STEAM.

On March 30th the Boston express train entered New York in a novel condition -lighted by electricity and heated by steam. It was a signal triumph of science, and an exemplification of the marvelous strides taken in the development of those processes by which the elements are made subject to man peculiar to the latter times. The following on the subject appeared in the

The cars themselves are worthy o lescription, though fine woodwork and cabinet finish are not novelties. The baggage car, smoker, two passenger coaches, and two drawing-room cars all have the Roman arch roof, which gives an imposing exterior and in-terior effect. The dark manogany finish that is uniform in the passenger cars would be, in the gloom of ordi-nary kerosene oil lamp lighting, too sombre. But there is no oil burning except in the headlight, and the twenty incandescent electric lamps that ar ranged in double rows along the high ceiling of the cars effectively light up the beautiful markings of the natural wood. Each light is of sixteen-candle power, and the steady glow is fed from the storage batteries of the Julien system. Newspapers may be read with case, and the cars are cheerful and pleasant. There are sixty storage cells to each car placed under the floor between the rucks, and they may be charged with lestricity while the train is laid up on a side track in Boston. They will fold twelve hours' supply of electric fluid so as to make the round trip to New York and return, and with time to

The steam heating device is what is known as the Martin system, and conists of an arrangement of pipes which take live dry steam from the dome of he locomotive and conduct it through the car so as to distribute the heat thoroughly. The dis-inctive features of the system are an automatic pressure regulating valves on the engine, and controlling valves for each car from a main pipe below the car, so that the different cars may be kept at varying temperatures. The water of condensation is carried off by in automatic drip and does not return to the boiler. The live dry steam is thus enabled to do its perfect work. The cars were warmed yesterday or very low pressure, despite the March vinds, and yet there was no fire on the train back of the roaring furnace under the locomotive boiler. ## TREATY WITH NORTHERN IN

DIANS.

An Idaho journal contains the fol "John V. Wright, of Tennessee, J W. Daniels, of Mirnesota, and H. W. Andrews, of New York, commissioners appointed to visit the Indians of the mission and effected the terms of a treaty, which have been approved by the Spokane and Cœur d'Aleues, and signed by their chiefs and head men in the presence of the great body of the Indians after being fully explained to the Indians. The Indians relinquish to the whites about 400,000 acres of land outside of the present reservation of the Cour d'Alenes and the Spokanes with the full consent of the Cour d'Alenes agree to go and live upon the reservation of the latter, and this reservation is to be theirs forever for joint occupancy, unless they agree to part with it. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars is to be paid to them by the government, \$30,000 the firs year and \$8,000 per year for the period of fifteen years subsequent thereto. It also provides that no white man can come upon this reservation and marry one of the women of their tribu without first producing evidence of good character, which shall be approved by the agent in charge, the head chief and minister in charge."

The Baily Fatal R. R. Accident. ST. JOHNSVILLE, N. Y., April 19.-The passenger train on the New York Central Railroad met with an accident near this place near midnight. A land slide which had been caused by rains, threw the engine from the track. Engineer Edward Canarr was killed and the fireman had his leg broken. The passengers were badly shaken up, but none were seriously injured. The wrecked train consisted of eight cars, all but one of which left the track. The landslide was 120 feet long.
