# DEAL HAS BEEN MADE.

#### Silver Shield and United Bingham to Enter a Merger.

Harry S. Joseph, who has been in the east for the past two months working up a deal for the consolidation of the Silver Shield and United Bingham mines in Bingham has advised Secy. Mead that the task has been practical. ly accomplished and it is now up to the stockholders of those corporations to ratify the deal.

The new company is to be known as the United Bingham Consolidated Mining company with a capital stock of \$2,500,000, represented by 560,000 shares. Of this stock, 100,000 shares is to be exchanged for the 500,000 shares of the United Binghum and 165,000 shares is

to be exchanged for the 200,000 shares of Silver Shield stock. # COMBINATION MINE.

#### Suit Over Title Now on Trial at Carson, Nevada.

A Carson, Nevada, dispatch says: The trial of the suit of John Jones against L. L. Patrick, in which is in-volved the title to one-eighth of the noted Combination mine at Goldheid, has been on trial here for several days and some of the most noted mining at-torneys in this section, are engaged on the case. In 1893 an option on the Combination was given to Patrick who, with the assistance of Jones, affected a sale of the property. Jones subsequently claimed that he had a half interest in the option and should have shared equally with Pat-rick in the profits of the trade that was made while Patrick claims that he was made while Patrick claims that he was not a principal at all but acted as an assisting agent, who did not take an important part in the transaction. During the trial it developed that Patrick had a difficult time convincing

capitalists that his mine was really one of value. Many of those approached were diffident about investing and intimated that the property, which is now one of the biggest in Goldfield, was a wildcat. The Patrick interest in the mine is

valued at \$250,000.

ARRESTED IN JAIL.

#### Montana Prisoner Will be Held as a **Fugitive From Justice.**

William Paisley, who was arrested here Saturday on the charge of holding up and robbing Manager Thomas Malane of the Hennessey Mercantile company at Centerville, Mont. on Jan. 9, and stealing \$3,000, is still in jail. An account of the man's arrest and the recovery of \$1,182.18. appeared in Saturday evening's "News." It was expected that City Detective Charles E. Garvey of Butte would reappeared in Saturday evening's News. It was expected that City Detective Charles E. Garvey of Buite would re-turn with his prisoner on Saturday night, but that official was delayed and surpris-ed when he went for the prisoner, to find that the latter refused to go with the of-ficer without regulsition papers. Papers have been telegraphed for, and tis expected that they will reach here to-morrow morning, and that the officer and his prisoner will leave for Buite tomorrow night. In the meantime, Paisley is still in the city fail. This morning a complaint charging him with being a fugitive from justice was sworn to and Sergeant Hempel served a warrant on the prisoner, charging him with highway robbery. This was done to prevent the prisoner from getting away on a mere technicality. Paisley became very angry but that made no difference. Paisley's wife was released from jail yesterday morning and is trying to find means to liberate her husband. As yet the prisoner has not been permitted to see anyone, and no attorney has called to see him.

The local detectives have about given up hope of capturing the man. It is claimed that Palsiey and a pal. encountered Malanc on the 3th of the pres-ent month, just as the latter was closing up the store. The robbers forced him to throw up his hands and then they march-ed him to the rear of the store and com-pelled him to open the safe. A sack con-taining \$2.000 in greenbacks and gold was taken, and the robbers escaped after Ma-lane had fired three shots at them. Detective Garvey says that the Butte officials have almost positive proof that Paisley was one of the robbers.
