It is rumored that several telegrams It is rumored that several telegrams have been sent by different delegates to Blaine asking him if he would accept the nomination, and that Blaine's friend, notably Elkins and Manly, have also cabled asking Blaine to make no reply, thereby allowing the impression to prevail that he would accept.

He will not be placed in nomination under any circumstances, and his friends trust that his friends in the convention will refrain from vot

ing for him until every other man has had an opportunity for nomination. 




