An arrival from Park City last evening declared that there is no doubt about it; that while negotiations have not been entirely closed he was of the opinion that an understanding had been reached. reached as to the basis upon which the Creole will go into the amalgamation and that all but arranging some of the details the deal is practically consum-

details the deal is practically consummated.

Officers of the Creole company seen by a "News" representative today declared there was nothing to say and were rather reluctent to admit that such a deal had been pending, or that such a thing had been even suggested.

People familiar with the situation at Park City are of the opinion that the Creole should go into the coalition; that it would be a distinct advantage to the shareholders of that organization if the exchange of stock can be made on some equiltable basis.

In the re-organization of the Treasure Hill company shareholders of the cill organization are to get share for share in the exchange notwithstanding that the criginal company was capitalized for 450,000 and the new for 1,000,000 shares. The remaining 600,000 shares, which went into the treasury, is partly to be used in the acquisition of other ground while the public will have an operating the directors.

Milford, Aug. 2.—Those who think the natural wealth occasionally brought to the surface in Utah does not immediately attract attention abroad ought to think again, as witness: The Dixie oil field contains more representatives of capital from other states than from Utah. H. J. Keate, of Milford, just returned from an extended visit there, during which he became extensively interested, saw but one other Utah man during the sojourn, and that was Harry S. Joseph of Salt Lake, although Cedar City's investors are said to have raised \$160,000 to back and push their holdings in the new field of wealth.

But look at this: The first well bored was by Rhyolite and Los Angeles people, and from this they have a daily flow of 80 barrels. Having thus demonstrated the productive capacity of this part of their holdings they are now removing their derrick and boring apparatus some six miles to another part of the ground to give it a trial, but in the meantime they have three more well-driving machines on the way.

Mr. Keate has gone to Salt Lake carrying samples of the crude oil for analysis, also to arrange for machinery to work the ground in which he is interested. He reports that representatives of every great oil field and all the big companies in the country are on the ground and those who have anything on which any kind of showing can be made have no trouble in disposing of it. People are drifting in continually and the extent to which the productive ground extends is of course unknown, but undoubtedly the area will be expanded so far and so long as practical results follow the probing. That such immense fields as those of Pennsylvania and West Virginia some years ago, or even of southern California and Texas in more recent times, are Pennsylvania and West Virginia some years ago, or even of southern California and Texas in more recent times, are about to be duplicated in our sunny south is hardly looked for, yet why not? There have been no disappointments to speak of so far; the oil is known to be there in great quantity, and only the most complete exploitation by incars of abundant outlay and scientific development can determine development can determin what the subterranean caverns are cap-able of yielding forth. All appearances are decidedly supportive of the belief that we will not have to wait very long to be satisfied.

Work Started at Star Consolidated-New Compressor for Little Chief-Other News.

Special Correspondence Eureka, Aug. 2.—There has been nothing doing at the Centennial Eureka mine since Sunday, and as a consequence the week's shipments from the district are light. There has been a few men at work on top repairing the big engine which has been in use contin-uously for 15 years, and this is the first time that extensive repairs have been necessary.
