I am well, and feel that my journey and change of air are having a beneficial effect upon me. I have been told by persons whom I have visited that you did not know how many hearts were made glad when you were delivered from your deten-tion. Bros. Twenty thousand voices made "Old Hundred" roar. There were probably 50,000 who stood outside the building, and who either would not pay the five dollars admission fee, or were afraid the building would fall upon them.
