CARDSTON, CANADA OUTLOOK OF GREAT PROSPERITY the Phenomenal Change in Temperature-Farming Operations Begun. Special Correspondence. Special Correspondence. Cardston, Alberta, Canada, Feb. 1.— From 25 below to 50 above zero 'n two hours time is the weather record of the last week. On Tuesday, Jan. 23, the day began with a real Hudson bay chinook, and the mercury dropped so low, only accurate instruments re-corded the temperature exactly, but in about one hour, a gentle breeze came from the opposite direction; the war of winds was sharp and snappy and when the whirlpool of fog cleared away orders citing the plaintiffs to appear and show further cause why they should not pay such costs. the whirlpool of fog cleared away spring time broke with unexpected force.
