If Halvorsen re-covers from his injuries a case of batcovers from his injuries a case of pat-tery will be pushed against Lewis, and if not it will amount to a graver of-fense. The battery case will be dis-missed and he will be held for murder

The case of the Slate will be held for murder or for manslaughter. The case of the Slate vs Don Lewis of Lewiston, who is charged with a statutory offense, will come before William Brangham, justice of the peace, on Thursday. Lewis was arraigned and the plea taken when a question arose as to his age. County Attorney A. A. Lay has been investigating the case, but can find no record as to the boy's age. The case will be thrashed out in the fusice's court and if it is determined from the evidence in the case that the boy is under age, he will be turned over to the juvenile court. At that court it is likely he will be given a term of years in the reform school.
