

# SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Atty. Devine Disapproves Solons' Hasty Action—Poll Tax Collector on the Carpet.

## AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

Weber Club Determined on Smelter; Farmers Unalterably Opposed—Runaway Accident.

Ogden, Feb. 4.—The city council met in regular session last evening. City Attorney James Devine sent in a communication with reference to the confirmation of the appointment of a city jailer and two desk sergeants at the last meeting of the city council. The attorney expressed the opinion that the appointments made by the police committee and confirmed by a majority of those present at the last meeting were illegal. The opinion was filed without comment or further action.

The Chief of Police submitted a list of his appointments, in which he removed his assistant, Lon Rogers, and appointed D. L. Lee to the place, and these appointments were approved. Councilman Powers objected to the removal of Rogers, and succeeded in bringing out the fact that the reason for the change was that Rogers was not in harmony with the chief. The vote for confirmation was 9 to 1.

Auditor Mrs. F. O. Stanford reported to the council that former Poll Tax Collector Fred C. Naisbitt had failed to make a final report of the money he had received while in office, also to turn over the books of the office, although he had been requested to do so several times. The amount owed the city by Mr. Naisbitt, according to the auditor's statement, is \$485. The report was referred to the tax committee for investigation.

Because of the refusal of the former treasurer to submit a statement to his successor in office, the law committee recommended that a man be employed to audit the treasurer's books, and the recommendation was referred to the auditing committee, with power to act.

The sanitary inspector reported 60 cases of contagious diseases.

The report of the municipal court for January showed receipts of \$2,422.

**COALVILLE TRAIN DISCONTINUED.**

The local train between Ogden and Coalville is discontinued by the Union Pacific as it is claimed the traffic does not pay expenses. For the convenience of passengers from Park City and other way stations, an extra coach will be put on the fast mail known as No. 3.

**GREEK LABORER HURT.**

At a late hour yesterday a Greek, who had been laboring at Lakeside on the Southern Pacific, was brought into the local hospital with both legs broken. A large boulder fell upon him while he was working in some rock.

**WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.**

Cholera Decimating Hog Pens—County Cannot Build Bridge.

Ogden, Feb. 4.—The farmers of Weber county, especially in the northern section, have been suffering heavy losses during the past few weeks in their hogs dying from a form of hog cholera. It was reported at the meeting of the board of county commissioners yesterday that fully 100 hogs had died during the past two weeks from the disease on farms near North Ogden and Pleasant View, and smaller numbers in other sections. The commissioners had secured the promise of Dr. H. J. Frodsham, instructor in veterinary science, at the Agricultural college, and Dr. T. B. Beatty, secretary of the state health board, to visit Ogden next Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock to meet with the hog raisers of the county and discuss the situation and devise means of quarantine for the infected swine. All interested in the matter are requested to be present.

The commissioners also announce that Dr. Beatty will meet the health officers of the county at 10 o'clock Saturday morning at the courthouse to give them instructions on their duties.

**SMALLPOX AT HOOPER.**

Health Officer Parker of Hooper returned to the board that Mrs. William Woodworth, who nursed the late Mrs. Manning and her babe, who died of smallpox, has been stricken with the disease, together with six of her children, also that two other people who had been exposed, have come down with the disease. He also reports numerous cases of chickenpox, measles and diphtheria. He was instructed to keep a strict quarantine and to render any assistance necessary.

Overseer of Poor Stanford reported that he has been called on several times of late to render assistance to wives who, with their children, have been deserted by their husbands and left in destitute circumstances. County Atty.
