LOCAL BRIEFS.

Thirty-three cars of coal arrived over the Rio Grande and 23 over the Short Line, or about 1,500 tons, a good day's supply.

The Grand Lodge for Masons for Utah will meet next Tuesday in this city in annual session. Last year the meeting was in Ogden.

Examination for lieutenantcies is now in progress at Fort Douglas. Veterinarian LeMay has been relieved from duty with the batteries at the post.

In default of the payment of their fines, amounting to \$10 each, nine Greeks and Austrians are now serving time in the county jail for fast driving at Murray.

The third ball under the auspices of the Granite state amusement committee will be given in the state amusement hall Friday evening. Grand march at 8:30.

The gymnasium at the State University will open next Monday for exercising and two rowing machines, like the one in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium, will be installed there.

A. C. Hatch and Charles S. Carter of Heber have filed application with the city engineer for 1,000 feet of water from the Green river in Utah county for irrigating purposes.

At its Feb. 5 meeting the stockholders of the Utah Savings & Trust company expect to increase their capital stock from \$150,000 to \$250,000. The funds will be used in erecting their new building.

A judgment of dismissal has been entered in the federal court in the case of George Paraskevoulou against the Yampa Smelter company. The lawyers had fixed it up out of court for \$500 satisfaction.

WHY JONES ASKS FOR NEW TRIAL

Plaintiff's Attorneys in Tribune
Libel Suit Allege Misconduct.

REPORTS WERE PREJUDICIAL.

Claimed that They Affected the Minds
Of the Jurors and General Public.

In support of his motion for a new trial in the case of W. R. Jones, Jr., against the Salt Lake Tribune et al., the attorneys for plaintiff have filed an affidavit setting forth the alleged misconduct of defendants during the trial by the publication of prejudicial reports of the case which, it is claimed, prejudiced the minds of the public and of the jurors against plaintiff. The affidavit is signed by N. H. Tanner, one of plaintiff's attorneys, and accompanying it are the articles complained of. Following is the body of the affidavit:

"The defendants during said trial used various means of misconduct as follows: The defendant, Salt Lake Tribune Publishing company, during the progress of said trial, published and circulated the Salt Lake Tribune generally throughout Salt Lake county, and the same was read by the public generally, and some of the jurors sitting in the case were subscribers of said paper, and others were readers of the same.

"That the defendant, Frank I. Seifert, during the time of said trial, was general manager of said Tribune Publishing company and managed and directed the publication of said paper and the printed matter published therein.

"That during the progress of said trial and while the testimony therein was being taken in court and before the jury, the defendant, Salt Lake Tribune Publishing company, caused to be published and circulated among the public generally in Salt Lake City and county and among the jurors, containing serious, uncalculated and prejudicial reflections upon the said plaintiff and by said articles so published and circulated, intended to and did prejudice the public mind and the minds of the jurors against the plaintiff and his cause and thereby prevented the plaintiff from having a fair and impartial trial in this case.

"Copies of the articles published and circulated as aforesaid are hereto attached and made a part of this affidavit. Affiant refers especially to the headline and content contained in said articles, and each of them, all of which in view of the progress of said trial were calculated to prejudice and did prejudice the plaintiff, and as affiant verily believes, prevented him from having a fair and impartial trial, all of which is directly attributable to the irregularities and misconduct of the defendant, Salt Lake Tribune Publishing company and Frank I. Seifert."

FROZE TO DEATH.

William H. Pickering, Jr., Did Not Die
From Dose of Chloroform.

It now transpires that the demise of William H. Pickering, Jr., whose death at Myton was announced in the "News" several days ago, was not the result of a dose of chloroform as at first supposed, but was caused through freezing, the man's body having been found on the roadside at a point a short distance from the Dora settlement. It appears that Mr. Pickering, accompanied by Reuben Whitehead, a companion, went to Dora on New Year's day ostensibly for the purpose of attending a dance there. The former had some chores to attend to on his ranch and he accordingly left for home, while Whitehead remained at Dora for the dance. Nothing further was heard of him till the next morning when Whitehead was accosted by the main carrier, who said he had seen him on his person, a drug he used to allay the pain incident to neuralgia, it was quite evident that death was due to the extreme cold, the victim being rather thin and on account of having left his overcoat at the settlement. The body was taken to Price by Ammon Nebeker, from which point it was forwarded to Payson, home of the deceased, where the funeral was held on Monday afternoon.

The deceased was highly respected by a wide circle of friends and the obsequies, which were held from the First ward meetinghouse, were largely attended, and were presided over by Bishop Loveless. The speakers were Elder Isaac Ross, Bishop Jesse Taylor of the Second Ward and Partridge J. D. Evans, all of whom offered words of comfort and consolation to the stricken relatives. The ward choir furnished appropriate selections, while a quartet, composed specially for the occasion by C. P. Hulsh, was a feature of the service.

Mr. Pickering leaves a wife and three children, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. He was 37 years of age, and with his brother, Wesley, had been located on the reservation ever since the opening of that country to settlement.

TRAGIC RUNAWAY.

It took a half hour before they collided with a tree and were caught. The Supply company's horse, valued at \$125, was shot by Officer Moore. The driver of the fruit team took to the woods, on seeing what his head had done, and the owners recovered the horses later.
