"Enquirer" Notes.—The F. story is expected to close in a few days, and will remain so for about three months.

A snowslide came off from the mountain a little below the South Fork, Provo Canon, this week, and has blocked the road for a considerable distance.

The Tinkles are said to be looking up a little. Men of capital are investing in them, and everything bids fair for prosperity in the future. Teams are wanted to haul ore and other freight between the mines and the Santaquin depot.

The U. S. R. K. Company is building a large ice-house, 41 x 25, at the depot, in which to store a supply of ice for the season. Hereafter the company has shipped its ice supply in bulk from here to Salt Lake, but will now carry it there as needed.

At the board meeting of Utah County Coop. Cattle and Sheep Herd, held yesterday, a dividend of 18 per cent. was declared on the business for the year, to be paid after the 1st of January next. Today at the stockholders' meeting, officers for the ensuing year will be elected.

"It is Said."—The following came over the wires, from Washington, this afternoon: "It is said that the chief Jack, who figured in the recent troubles, is a Mormon priest. He was raised and educated, it is said, by Bishop Heber Kimball, and is a missionary among his people, many of whom belong to the Mormon Church. The proposition to remove the Cies now in Colorado, is looked upon in some quarters as an attempt to make Mormons of them, because, it is said, the Utah Cies are Mormons."

A few more "It is said," scattered through such an article, would have a wonderful effect in confirming its truth. Who ever heard of "Bishop Heber Kimball" so far as we know, no such bishop ever belonged to the "Mormon" Church. The rest of the tale is about equally consistent.

Children's Opera.—The "Pinafore" performances of last week, were an artistic success, and were fairly patronized, though the inclemency of the weather prevented many from attending Saturday night. Professor Smyth worked untidily in the matter, and we could have seen him better repaid with pleasure. One of the drawbacks to the performance was the sickness of Master Sammy Kirkman, the original "Ralph," (concerning whom many inquiries have been made) who was obliged to refrain from participating on account of a severe and persistent hoarseness. His part was well sustained by Miss Petersen, on short notice. The engagement furnished much amusement, and the little actors all added new laurels to their already flourishing store.

The Salt Lake Assembly Hall.—The building in course of erection, heretofore as the New Tabernacle, was re-christened this morning, and will henceforth bear the name of the Salt Lake Assembly Hall. President John Taylor and Elder Joseph F. Smith, and Elders Angus M. Cannon, and David O. Calder, of the presidency of the Stake, met with Elders Geo. Goddard and Henry Grow, of the committee on construction, and decided on the above title. It was also determined, as announced previously, to hold the next Stake conference in the building. This will begin on Saturday, January 3d, 1880, at 10 a. m. The building will not be entirely finished by that time, but the necessary efforts will be made to have it so far completed that it can be used for the purpose desired.

Carlotta Patti.—This celebrated musical star makes her first appearance before the Salt Lake public, to-morrow evening, in a grand concert, in which she will be assisted by a corps of talented vocalists whose reputations, preceding their arrival, claim for them all that is beautiful and artistic in the realm of song. The sale of tickets still progresses, for single or both nights, and there is no doubt but these concerts will receive the patronage their character and standard deserve.

Plasterers and Laborers Wanted.—As it is designed to hold the next Stake Quarterly Conference in the building now approaching completion, which has heretofore been designated as the "New Tabernacle," it is earnestly desired that three or four more plasterers, and as many laborers, go to work on the interior of the place, immediately, so as to advance its completion as much as possible before the set time. In order to arrange matters satisfactorily, the plastering must be finished by Wednesday night. Plasterers and laborers will therefore please appear in force to-morrow morning, ready for work.

Relief Society Organized.—The Ladies Relief Society of Perch Creek, Sanpete County, was organized on the 5th inst., under the direction of Bishop Taylor and the local authorities. The following named ladies were chosen and set apart as the officers of the Society: president, Mary Ann Taylor; first counselor, Cecelia Larsen; second counselor, M. J. Aldridge; secretary, Hannah G. Talbot; treasurer, Helen Kilpack.

The above was forwarded by J. E. King, secretary of the preliminary meeting.

Antimony Discovered.—Mr. Edward Desautels, of Clover Flat, Piute County, writes under date of the 11th inst., informing us of the discovery of an extensive ledge of good antimony. The ledge is located in a canyon of one of the branches of the San Joaquin River, and was discovered accidentally by our informant and a number of others, who had gone to the place for the purpose of building a saw mill.

Leland Stanford, of California, will arrive in this city to-morrow evening on the regular Union Pacific express train, and will be taken off the cars here for a rest of a day or two before being forwarded to San Francisco. The value of the horses is \$45,000.
