MASON VALLEY  
COPPER DISTRICTThe Douglas Group of Claims Has  
Been Secured by Salt Lake  
Mining Men.

## OREM AND HAGGENBARTH

Are the Purchasers—One of the Gilt  
Edged Properties of the West—  
ern Nevada Camp.

That the Mason Valley district in western Nevada is destined to become one of the great copper camps of the America is splendidly exemplified by the recent movements of men prominent in the copper mining world. In fact a the Mason Valley region has been a center of attraction for some time past, and powerful interests have secured a foothold there.

Capt. De Lamar's experts were among the first to realize the importance of the country, resulting in the purchase of the Bluestone group of mines, in which some tremendous bodies of high grade copper ore have been opened—estimated to be no less than 1,000,000 tons. Later, Senator Clark of Montana acquired the McConnell group and, not to be outdone in the chase for bonanzas, George Gunn, representing the American Smelting & Refining company, has tied up the Sprague and Dyer groups, which are now undergoing final examination.

The latest deal recorded is the one closed up in this city a few days ago, when Walter C. Orem, manager of the Utah Apex and New Red Wing mines of Birmingham and Frank J. Haggenborth, the well known mining engineer, secured an option on the Douglas group of claims owned by California parties, consisting of somewhere between 400 and 500 acres. Mr. Orem made a personal inspection of the property, and to a "News" representative today, declared that it without doubt one of the best propositions he had ever seen. Accompanied by well known engineer, Mr. Orem made a thorough sampling of the ore bodies exposed, and found that in the mine proper there are at least 20,000 tons of 8 per cent copper ore blocked out and available for extraction at the present time. The veins usually run from 20 to 30 feet in width, carrying an eight-foot rich pay streak.

The formation in this particular portion of the district is composed of limestone and porphyry, and the surface croppings on the Douglas group cannot be excelled anywhere in the camp.

The former owners of the property have kept a record of the shipment of 800 tons of ore, made principally during the past year, and similar returns in copper running from 12 to 18 per cent. Much of the ore now blocked out is of this character and shipments could be continued indefinitely.

The future plans of Messrs. Orem and Haggenborth have not been fully determined, but there is no doubt but that a new company will be formed and that the mine will be operated upon an extensive scale.

## WILL NOT COME HERE.

**Nat Boas, the San Francisco Broker, Visits Salt Lake En Route East.**

Nat Boas, a prominent San Francisco broker, came in from the west yesterday afternoon and remained over until this afternoon, when he departed for the east on the Overland limited.

Mr. Boas is loyal to San Francisco and is ready to believe that the coast city is destined to become as the leading market center of the western portion of the United States. He, therefore, is not willing to transfer his operations to this city, but will resume business in the new San Francisco as soon as the banks open for the transaction of business.

It will be several weeks, Mr. Boas says, before the exchange can resume its regular calls. In the meantime he is going east to promote another mining proposition in which Nevada property will form the basis.

UP OGDEN CANYON.

Rapid Transit Company to Extend Its Existing Lines.

(Special to the "News.")

Ogden, May 3.—The latest move taken by the Ogden Rapid Transit company to extend its lines and block other companies from taking right-of-way over a route it desires to have, has been taken again by the building of a short stretch of track in Ogden canyon.

David Eccles of the local company, when seen concerning the matter, stated that it was only a step forward in the proposed extension of lines.

There is a population of about 3,000 in Ogden, which has no street car or railroad connection with Ogden City, and if people desire to come to Ogden they must drive a distance of about 12 miles, which practically requires a whole day in traveling to and fro, whereas if they had street car connections with this city, an hour only would be consumed. It will also be great benefit to the produce raisers who will be able to get their products on the market early in the morning.

The total number of freight cars handled in the Ogden yards during the month of April was 36,121, and the number of passenger cars was 5,278, making in all something over 3,000 more cars hauled than during the corresponding month of the previous year.

It is also understood that the Transit company will eventually continue its car line from Ogden valley northward over the divide to Cache county, which may be the route taken by the Utah & Idaho Railroad company for its proposed interurban line from Provo up into Idaho. The Ogden canyon right-of-way is a very good one, and the local concern acquiring it, will give it a pre-emptive over all other lines.

Mr. Eccles states that his company already acquired practically the entire right-of-way through the canyon, which work has been going on quietly for several months past. It is very evident that the Salt Lake & Ogden Railroad company also had an eye on the Ogden canyon route, as it is going to build its line to the mouth of the canyon this summer, and Mr. Bamberger

is understood to be the Lost Packer Mining & Smelting company.

The Lost Packer is considered to be one of the biggest mining propositions in the Gem State, and some exceedingly rich gold-copper ore has been shipped from the mine in the past. A smelter, with capacity for treating 100 tons of ore per day, was installed last year.

THE OGDEN SMELTER.

David Eccles, president of the Utah Smelting company, is down from Ogden today. Asked concerning progress made with the construction of the company's new plant, he stated that the grading of the spur on the tracks of the Oregon Short Line railroad had been completed and that the rails were on the ground for the track.

All the equipment for the smelter has been ordered, Mr. Eccles said, and as soon as the railroad is completed the structural material and equipment will be hurried in and the building of the plant hurried as rapidly as possible.
