LOCAL BRIEFS.

Halloween Party—The Twelfth ward M. I. A. will give a Halloween party in the "Wandering Jew" next Wednesday evening.

Caledonian Club—There will be a meeting of Scotchmen next Thursday evening, at the residence of James Stirling, 340 East Fifth South street, to reorganize the Caledonian club.

W. W. C. A. Entertainment—The Y. W. C. A. inaugurated a series of monthly entertainments last evening, at the Second East street home, with a musical. A supper followed the program.

Reaper Editor Here—Editor Jesse P. Bean of the Richfield Reaper is in town on a business trip. He reports his section of the state as very prosperous, due to good crops and corresponding prices, as well as heavy mining production.

Work For Classes—Each class at the state university will have a part allotted to it in rebuilding the athletic grounds fence, while the faculty will repair the bleachers. All students will furnish their own tools.

To Rebuild Plant—The directors of the packing plant yesterday afternoon, decided to take an inventory of the destroyed property, and expressed themselves as in favor of rebuilding as soon as the insurance can be adjusted. It is expected to save more of the property than was at first thought possible.

Semi-Annual Session—The local missionary union met yesterday afternoon and evening, in the East Side Baptist church in semi-annual session. Mrs. C. G. Plummer was chosen president; Mrs. G. B. Rakely, secretary, and Mrs. George M. M. M. treasurer. A number of interesting papers were read on a variety of topics.

Automobile Fire—An automobile, belonging to the Utah Auto company, caught fire last evening owing to a leak in the gasoline tank. The gasoline became ignited in some manner, not explained, and set fire to the machine and the floor of the garage. The fire department responded promptly and extinguished the flames. The loss was nominal.

R. W. Kidder Dead—Ralph W. Kidder, aged 26, a brother of E. G. Kidder, of 1014 Main East street, died last evening, from heart troubles, after being indisposed for a month. The deceased was an engineer on the San Pedro road, and a member of Battery A, First Artillery, and had extended service in the islands. He leaves a wife and child.

Had a Narrow Escape—About 3:30 yesterday afternoon, while Mrs. Geo. A. Whitaker was approaching the home of her sister, Mrs. Rogers, on D and Eighth streets, there was a port from a fire and instantly Mrs. Whitaker heard and felt a bullet pass her head. The bullet struck the porch and then flattened out against the brick wall. Who fired the shot remains to be learned.

The Voss Estate—A petition for letters of administration of the estate of Horace H. Voss, the colored man who was shot and killed by another colored man on Oct. 14, has been filed in the probate division of the district court by Lizzie Voss, the widow of deceased. The estate consists of a half interest in real estate in this city valued at \$2,000 and \$250 in cash. The heirs to the estate are the petitioner, her two children and the mother of Voss.

Institute Work—Prof. W. M. Stewart of the training school and Miss Vincent of the State Normal school will visit Price shortly for institute work. The second of a series of Thursday afternoon lectures at the state university to be given under the auspices of Prof. Stewart, was given yesterday by Prof. L. E. Young on "New Phylaxis." The normal school students have decided to contribute towards the \$125 debating cup. The training school students will be required to pass a physical examination to test the muscles and the senses, by the medical school officers. The results will be recorded and kept for reference, and valuable information is anticipated as to the relation of physical training to education.

MADE GRUESOME FIND.

Workmen, While Digging Trench Unearthed Two Skeletons.

Workmen of the Utah Gas & Coke company secured a gruesome find yesterday afternoon, while digging a trench at Eighth and K streets, in the unearthing of two skeletons. They are said by old residents of that part of the city to be the remains of two cowboys, one of whom killed the other while both were celebrating with a drunk in this city, 38 years ago. The skeletons were found in a trench, and the bodies were buried side by side. The names of the parties involved in this "unfortunate occurrence" are not remembered. A cowboy's hat was found in one of the graves with the remains of some fabric; but the identity of the parties is not known.

HAWLEY GOES INSANE.

Prisoner at County Jail Suddenly Seized Last Night.

While awaiting trial upon the charge of grand larceny, C. J. Hawley, a prisoner at the county jail, went violently insane last night and had to be placed in the padded cell. He was not removed from the cell in the morning, however, until after he had severely beaten his cellmate, John Holmes, and torn the bedding all to pieces. County Physician Whitely was called and gave the man a dose of quinine and a nerve tonic. The first indication Hawley gave of insanity was directly after supper, when the lei forth a terrific yell which aroused the whole jail. He then pounced upon Holmes and threw him to the floor, tore his clothing and beat him severely. Hawley then started to tearing up the bedding, but was dragged from his cell by jailer Sperry and several trustees and held down until Sheriff Emery arrived on the scene and helped to put him in the padded cell. Dr. Whitely was then called, as the man kept raving and yelling and it became necessary to give him a drug to quiet him. He will probably be examined as to his sanity this afternoon sometime.

SPokane Relief Society

Bunko Gang in Washington Gets \$20 and is Arrested in Five Minutes.

THEIR METHODS WERE MILD.

Did Not Flash the Badge of Police Department and Bad Victims in Name of Law.

They do things differently in Spokane. When a man gets buncoed by a gang, some of whom pose as police officers, the chief of police of Spokane does not condone with the victims and assist in getting them comfortably out of town.

Here is case taken from the Spokane Chronicle wherein a man was touched up for \$20 (not \$10,373 as was the case with the McWhiters) and a few minutes later five of the principals were under arrest.

"Startling revelations were made by the police today when an investigation was commenced by Sgt. Sullivan and Patrolmen Lister and McLeod of the methods of robbery used by the proprietors of a shooting gallery at 406 Main avenue.

"Five men have been arrested as participants in the game of graft which is said to have landed many a 'Mr. Easy Mark' into the hands of 'Joe Buckley, who is employed on the new building of the Holley-Mallison company at the corner of Railroad avenue and Howard street, residence at 288 Main.

"The game was played out of \$20 in the shooting gallery. As a result Charles Adams, A. Stevens, William Edwards, Justus Morris and Walter Dixon, all under arrest, at the shooting gallery, held on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

"Nolan will probably be held on the separate charge of impersonating an officer, as it was said at the station this morning that his time was occupied in standing at the door posing as an officer and using his tongue up authority to sell all disturbances which the dupes of the man behind the counter often made.

"The game that separated so many citizens from their coin was to all appearances an ordinary shooting gallery.

"The man who proposed to make himself rich by carrying away an express wagon load of cheap jewelry, guns and opera glasses, stood with a 'daisy' air gun a few feet from a board about 14 inches in diameter which was thickly hung with tags which were printed with the numbers supposed to correspond with the numbers on the guns, watches and other attractions hung in tempting array in the background.

"The tags were so thickly placed on the board that it was almost impossible to miss and the fortune hunter did not miss.

"The tag he struck was taken by the fifth gentleman behind the counter. Here, it is stated, it proved to be a double tag, that is, two tags fastened together with a rivet at the top. On the inner surface of one of the bits of pasteboard the numbers were placed in such a way that the operator could turn the covering back to various positions showing certain portions of the numbers which would make them entirely different. For instance, if a capper for the house shot, the operator would turn the bit of pasteboard so that he won a substantial prize, while the amateur outside who was backing the number lost his hand at marksmanship. It is said the tag was turned so the number behind the numbers would be some other article of comparatively no value.

"A number of complaints have been made, but Buckley's protest was so direct and so convincing that it brought results in a quick time.

NEW GAS CO. FORMALLY OPENS TONIGHT.

The Utah Gas & Coke company, which for some weeks has been installed in the Eldredge building on Main street, announces its formal opening for tonight, and invites the people of Salt Lake to "call around and see what it has to offer in the way of an exhibit with gas for light, heat and power. The company has certainly succeeded in fitting up one of the finest offices in the city, and the entire place will be thrown open to the public this evening, tomorrow and tomorrow night. Among the exhibits of interest which will be shown, are inverted lamps with incandescent burners, also lamps where a small chain attachment lights and turns them off. Another new gas effect lights with a switch or button on the wall just the same as the electric light. In fact, matches are done away with altogether. On the first floor, where the exhibition room and general offices are located, 10 ranges will be shown, as well as numerous gas plates and cookers, ranging from the small coffee urn to the large hotel range. In addition there will be bakers' ovens, candy furnaces, burners for melting lead, small stoves for heating, sad irons, tanners' irons, etc.

"The company's officers state that their service will be ready in the early spring, when they are compelled to pay the regular tax on their stock of merchandise, was not considered by the municipal law committee last night but will be taken up next Thursday evening.

Cox appeared before the committee in behalf of the league, and after considerable discussion the committee decided to leave it to the finance committee for further investigation at the meeting next Thursday evening.

The protest of a large number of merchants of the city against the license law which they are compelled to pay by the city government in addition to the regular tax on their stock of merchandise, was not considered by the municipal law committee last night but will be taken up next Thursday evening.
