Salt Lake Delegates Can 'Look for A Spirited Contest With Denver At the Portland Meeting.

COLORADOANS ARE IN TRAINING

Will Offer a Free Site for Headquarters Building-Col. Thomas Ewing's \$20,000 Endowment.

The Salt Lake delegates to the American Mining congress, which meets in Portland next month, are not going to have everything their own way, when it comes to capturing the permanent location of the congress. Denver is in training for the contest, and according to advices from the Colorado capital the delegates from that state are going prepared to offer some very attractive inducements to the members of the congress to award the prize to that city.

James Callbreath, a prominent lawyer and president of the chamber of commerce of Denver, and an eloquent

commerce of Denver, and an eloquent orator, has been selected to present the cialms of that city on the floor of the convention. The Denverites will offer a free site for the proposed headquarters building, and may go prepared to offer some kind of a bonus.

But Sait Lake has a geographical advantage which no other city has. The location of the congress in this city would mean a great deal to this community, and would make this the recognized headquarters for mining men. A big mining exhibit would be arranged as an attraction for tourists passing through the city and in many ways it would be the means of advertising the industry and bringing capital for the development of new propositions in this

industry and bringing capital for the development of new propositions in this and other states.

Col. Thomas Ewing, vice president of the congress, during his late visit to this city, said he believed the congress would be the means of building up a great mining institute superior to any in the country and he believed that the great mining institute superior to any in the country, and he believed that the city which wins the permanent location will never regret having made the fight for it. Col. Ewing declared to a "Newe" representative that he stands ready to subscribe \$20,000 towards laying the foundation for and building up such an institution. This endowment, coming from a man whose interests are confined entirely to other states, indicates that his whole heart and soul are in the upbuilding of the mining industry. CHANGES AT THE DALY-WEST MINE.

A New Eighty-Foot Gallows Frame Is to be Installed in the Near Future.

This Will Necessitate a Shut-Down for Possibly Ten Days-Dividend May be Passed.

The Daly-West Mining company is reparing to make some important imrovements at the main shaft house of ts Park City mine. A new gallows rame is to be installed and while this work is in progress it will necessitate closing of the mine for a reck or ten days. Assistant Manager rnest Bamberger, while admitting hat the changes mentioned were in ontemplation declared that it would some little time before the work of earing down the present gallows frame vould commence. The one now operated would commence. The one now operated has been in service for many years and just about outlived its period of usefulness. Again, with the shaft going to greater depths, the management has concluded that a larger plant will be required. The height of the frame now in use is 60 feet, while the new one will be 60 feet. ill be 60 feet.

The main workings of the mine consist of a cross-cut tunnel opening the vein at a depth of from 185 to 200 feet. On this level 400 feet of drifting has been done. An upraise has been made from the west end to the works above. From the upper part of this upraise a level is being run in the ore body, from which the ore is being tagen to run the mill. Another upraise has been started at the east end of the level. At that point the ore was struck. The ore body has a very flat dip to the east, the entire drift, 400 feet in length, being under it. On the surface this being under it. On the surface this ore body has been traced for about 800 feet. The mill is handling from 16 to 18 tons a day, and the ore already developed is sufficient to keep it in operation a year.

COLUMBUS CON.

Stockholders Will Hold Special Meeting

To Increase Capital Stock. A special meeting of the stockholders of the Columbus Consolidated Mining company has been called for Aug. 12. for the purpose of considering the mat-ter of increasing the capital stock of the corporation from \$150,000 to \$1,500,-000. It is not proposed to increase the number of shares, but to raise the par value of them from 50 cents to \$5. At the same meeting a resolution will probably be adopted changing the date of regular annual 16 etings from the first Monday in January to the first Monday in February of each year.

ON PROMONTORY POINT.

Extraction of Liquid Asphalt is Now in Progress.

The Utah Oil and Liquid Asphalt The Utah Oil and Liquid Asphalt company, an Ogden concern, has recently completed the installation of new equipment at its property on the Promontory point at the north end of the Great Salt Lake. Included in the equipment is a steam apparatus for the extraction of the asphalt from the earth. In the crude state the asphalt is a thick tarry substance: it will obse a thick tarry substance; it will oze out of the top of a pipe sunk dawn into the deposit, but hardens when epposed to the air. The stuff is too stuff to be successfully lifted to the surface to be successfully lifted to the surface by pumps; but to overcome this difficulty a device has been built to inject steam down to the asphalt body, by which means the product is reduced to liquid form. A report from Ogden is to the effect that the well as equipped at present is capable of producing 300 gallons a day. The present plant was put in as an experiment but if its success is thoroughly demonstrated it will open the way for the installation of a one capable of producing several hundred barrels a day.

ALTA-QUINCY SHIPMENTS.

Alta Mine is Now Contributing to the Local Ore Markets.

The Alta-Quincy mine at Alta has in-The Alta-Quincy mine at Alta has in-augurated shipments of high grade ore to the local smelters, so at the present time there are at least three mines in that camp contributing their riches to the local markets. The Alta-Quincy ground lies adjoining the Columbus Consolidated and South Columbus, and was the scene of some important strikes several weeks ago. In addition to the high grade stuff some extensive ore of a milling grade was encountered.

ACTIVITY AT LA PLATA.

Boston Syndicate Pushing Development Of La Plata Mine.

The development of the old La Plata mine in the La Plata mining district north of Ogden is being pushed ahead vigorously and those interested are vigorously and those interested are very sanguine as to the outcome, L. R. Held of Boston, representing the Boston syndicate that has control of the property has been in camp and set-tled up for work done in the tunnel by contract. The tunnel is now 1,000 feet long. The mine is under the superin-tendency of Fred Thackwell and it is the intention to do some cross-cutting from a point near the face of the tun-nel. Altogether about \$45,000 is said to have been expended on the property.


