LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.
Will Appear Twice.—Mr. B. B. Young, previous to his return to Europe, will appear twice in public on Monday at the Careless Orchestral Concert, and on the following Wednesday evening. The public will be glad of these opportunities of hearing the young and talented singer, previous to his departure for foreign shores.
Draper Items.—Mr. John Howard, agent for the Draper branch of Z. C. M. L., who is in the city on business, informs us that there has been some sickness in that locality this summer, but not many deaths. The Draper canal, designed to bring into cultivation several thousand acres more land, and which will extend to Cottonwood, is not yet finished, but will be in time for the farming operations of next season. The heaviest of the work is, that at Dry Creek, has been finished, and very little additional work will bring the water into the settlement. The canal runs through the town, so that it will only reach the land lying below, but the intention is to make a tangle of water rights and use the present supply for all the land lying above the canal.
The crops are about a fair average. There have been a few iron-clads sailing about in the neighborhood, but they have not evidently settled down to business, as no material damage has been done. The people are now busily engaged in threshing out the golden grain.

The Oregon Short Line.—Mr. Tom Jessup, a contractor on the Oregon short line of the U. P. R. R., canonically called the Granger line, is in the city, and made us a brief visit this morning. He says the work on that line is moving rapidly ahead, a large force of engineers now being employed. The grading is well advanced from Granger to Montpelier, and the track is laid for a distance of 25 miles from the former place. It is confidently expected that the road will be completed to Smith's Fork, 100 miles from Granger, some time this fall. It enters Bear Lake Valley six miles east of Montpelier, and follows the Bear River to Soda Springs, through which town it will pass. Mr. Jessup's grading contract extends 15 miles east and west of this place, and at present he has a force of 75 teams engaged thereon. Teams and men are in demand, and employment can be had at fairly remunerative prices. Our informant states that the letter signed "One Scrapper" and published in the News a week or two ago, wherein the actions of Mr. Dillon's nephews were made the subject of animal-versions, is greatly overdrawn. He says they have been prompt in payment and acted as perfect gentlemen, and are doing all in their power to further the work on the road.
