CEREGHINO WINS.

Short Line Restrained From Putting in a Switch on Third West,

The supreme court today reversed the judgment of the lower court in the case of Giovanna Cereghimo, appellant, against the Oregon Short Line Railread company and the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company, and ordered judg-& Machine company, and ordered judg-ment entered in favor of appellant aud a perpetual injunction issued against defendants to restrain them from con-structing a switch on Third West street to the machine company's warehouse in the interior of the block, between Sevenenth and Eighth South streets.

The opinion holds that the city coun-cil, in granting a franchise for, the switch without any regulations as to its maintenance and the operation of trains and cars to be moved over it, did not exercise reasonable discretion, and further that the permission was never granted, by the passage of an ordinance or a resolution as is required by law when a franchise is involved, hence the when a matter was in violation of the statutes. It was claimed by plaintiff in her complaint that the construction of the proposed switch would greatly in-terfere with the ingress and egress to Reveral houses which she owns on Third West street and would render them valueless for rental purposes. Upon the trial of the case the court below dissolved the temporary injunction and endered judgment in favor of defendants

The opinion reversing this judgment, which was written by Justice McCarty and concurred in by Chief Justice Eas-kin and Justice Bartch, holds further that a city council has not the power to grant a franchise which will burden the streets of a municipality and a the streets of a municipality and a switch track to be operated as a steam railway exclusively for the convenience and private use of a private corpora-tion, to the detriment of the citizens residing on such street and damage to their property abutting thereon.

USEFUL CITIZEN GONE.

Thomas F. Roueche, a Prominent Davis County Man, Dies at Kaysville.

(Special to the "News.")

Kaysville, Davis Co., Sept. 12.-Thomas F. Roueche, second counselor to Bishop Peter Barton, passed away

this morning, at 10 o'clock, He was born in Lincoln county, N. C., Feb. 9, 1833: was baptized in St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 22, 1854, by Elder William Cornish, and emigrated to Utah in 1855,

driving a team across the plains for Livingston and Kincaid and locating in Kaysville, where he has resided eve in Kaysville, where he has resided ever since. He was ordained a Seventy Aug. 16, 1857 and in 1861 he was set apart as a member of the council of the Fifty-fifth quorum of Seventy, which could be for the full of the sition he faithfully filled until June 29, 1877, when he was ordained a High Priest and set apart as second counselor to Bishop Peter Barton, which po-sition he held until his death.

In a civil capacity Elder Roueche has filled many positions of honor. He was the first mayor of Kaysville city and held the position successfully for 14 years. He served as a member of 14 years. He served as a member of the Utah Legislature in 1888 and as a selectman of Davis county from 1882 to 1890. He participated in the so-called Echo canyon war in 1857-58 and took a very active part in the defense of his people. In November, 1885, Pres-idents John Taylor and Geo. Q. Can-non, who were then in exile, made their home at the residence of Elder Roueche, together with their attend-ants. They remained there over eight months, or until the death of President Taylor, which occurred at the home of Brother Roueche July 25, 1887. Presi-dent Joseph F. Smith arrived one week before the death of the President. The before the death of the President. The deceased has four sons and two daughters living.

The funeral services will be held at the meetinghouse Monday at 2 o'clock.

GOOD RECORD OF BIRTHS.

Report Shows a Total of 38 for the Week - Typhoid Fever.

The birth rate in Salt Lake City for the week ending Sept. 12, is considerably higher than that of the preceding week, the total number of births reported being 38, 19 males and 19 females, as against 20 for the week before and 40 for the week corresponding in 1902. The deaths reported for the same period numbered 18, 7 being males and 11 fe-males, one third of the total being childen under two years of age. No new cases of scarlet fever were re-

orted during the week, and none having een discharged, left 5 cases in quarantine, as against the same number for the preceding week and 8 for the same week of last year. There was a case of diphtheria reported during the week and a like number discharged, leaving 2 a like number discharged, leaving 2 cases in quarantine, the same number as for the week previous and one-third the number in datention in the corre-sponding week of last year. One new case of smallpox developed and none having been discharged, left three cases in quarantine, one more than the number in detention a year ago. During the week 36 new cases of typhoid fever were reported, as against 35 for the week be-fore and 16 for the same week of 1992. This makes the total number reported luring the month 66 cases,
