his strength has improved.

5 p. m., Juze 13. A dispatch to the Central News from Berlin says the condition of the Emperor became worse this afternoon and his case is now admitted to be hopeless.

Porspam, June 13.—The fears entertained by the Emperor's physicians that inflammation of the lungs will supervene, are for the present removed by further developments in his illness. The Emperor now receives sufficient nourishment consisting of cream and whiskey given several times daily through a tube. The meiophagus is being affected by a local disease. 
