ENTENCED TO DEATH, - The Grand Jury of Weber county, having found a true bill against Gus. Sprouse, for the shooting of Martin Earl, at Uintah on the 15th of last October, his trial commenced at Ogden F. A. MITCHELL'S last Thursday morning in the Probate Court, before his Honor Judge F. D. Richards. After a careful hearing, the jury returned a verdict, on Saturday night, of murder in the first degree. The counsel for the prisoner then made a motion for a new trial, but the arguments adduced being MERCHANDISE! beenied insufficient, Judge Richards yes orday sentenced Sprouse to be shot at orglen on the 14th of January next.

The circumstances of the murder are these: The two men had been gambling, and a dispute arose between them about "the drinks" when Sprouse slapped the other in the face. On this both men ran out of the tent, Sprouse firing his pistol as they went, and in a few moments he again fired, the ball striking the deceased in the forehead whence it passed downwards and came out below his ear. Earl lived about three hours after he was shot. Sprouse immediately left for the East, but did not get further than Laramie, when he was turned back and held for trial.

TRACK LAYING RESUMED .- As a result of the arrival of so much railroad iron at Farmington, and the assurance that plenty more is not far behind, John W. Young, Esq., resumed track laying on the Utah Central yesterday. We believe that suffici-ent iron is now within reach to complete the line to the terminus in this city, and see no reason to fear that the track layers will be again stopped for want of material.

A STRANGE STORY .- Mr. James Carl, of Round Valley, Bich County, who arrived in this city this morning, vouches for the truth of the following strange story:

While passing through Ogden on Tuesday he learned that two young men, whose names he did not learn, went into a drug store and bought three quarts of alchohol. One then said to the other: "Let us drink 'till we die," and then drank a pint and a half of the liquid; the other a pint. The store tender, seeing what was done, got a police efficer to take them in charge, but he who had drunk the pint died in a very short time; the other one was just alive yesterday morning when Brother Carl left Ogden.

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
