"It was then about half-past two o'clock; and a motion prevailed that the execu-tion should take place at four p.m., in order to allow the prisoners to prepare for death. Means to carry out the sentence

wore taken. "The people had been very quiet and caim during the day. Often it rained by showers, and portions of the crowd would disperse to the shelter of adjacent buildings. Not a single loud voice was heard, nor an angry or boisterous demonstration during the whole day. Those bent on the execu-tion were determined, silent, and quietly carried out their movements. Those op posed to popular executions earnestly endeavored to convince others of their views; and those who were spectators preserved the same decorum. No dunken man, no boisterous conduct, or no visible excitement was apparent. We have seen dumhead courts-martial and military executions, but none even of them were conducted more selemly and orderly, and none so quietly.'

At half-past four o'clock the prisoners were taken to the place of execution:

"The wagon started; the box was jerked from under them; their necks were broken, scarcely a convulsive movement was ob-served; their bodies swung with the breezes that fan the face of this world, and their souls were exploring the unknown shore that lies beyond the valley of the shadow of death."







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
