

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—We are compelled to postpone a lengthy theatrical critique on the "Naiad Queen," a press of matter crowding it out till to-morrow. EXECUTION OF MILLARD.—We have received the following by Deseret Telegraph:

Provo 29th.—At 25 minutes to 11 o'clock, a. m., Chauncey W. Millard was taken to the place of execution, on the west side of the court house. He walked with the iron on his hands and feet. A chair was got for him, in which he sat a few minutes, and then rose to his feet, and read in a clear, full, firm voice, the 7th chapter of Matthew. He made no further remarks, but spoke something with the Sheriff and the police, and then sat down. The Sheriff then took the iron off his wrists, he placing himself in position; the Sheriff moved a few paces off and then gave the signal. Two bullets passed through his left breast. He raised his right hand a little, the testament from which he read, falling out of his hand, and all was over with him. He appeared quite firm. Before leaving the prison-room he seemed full, and would impulsively ask "what next?" and was apparently anxious to pass the ordeal, but gave no sensible sign of sorrow or repentance.

Four hundred persons were present. Good order was observed.

NEW RAILROAD COMMISSION.—Several months ago two commissions were appointed, one to examine the line of the Union Pacific Railroad, and another to examine the line of the Central Pacific Railroad. A new commission has been recently appointed, consisting of Major General G. K. Warren and Major J. J. Blenkinsdorf, of the former commission on the Union Pacific Railroad, and Lieutenant Colonel Williamson of that on the Central. Apparently the idea in appointing this new commission was to put it of those who had experience on both lines; and that the same minds and the same commission should examine and report on them.

These gentlemen are now in this city, and expect to start on their inspection sometime early next week. They will first examine the line between the ends of the tracks of the Union Pacific Railroad and Central Pacific Railroad, then proceed to San Francisco, and from that point inspect the whole line eastward.

OBITUARY.

Miss Augusta St. Clair, the well known lecturer, whose funeral discourse is published in another column, arrived in this city the last of November. Soon after she was attacked with mountain fever of the most violent type. She braved the disease with remarkable fortitude, and until the instant when she calmly breathed her last.

During all her sickness her mind appeared to dwell on heavenly concerns. The name of Jesus was almost constantly on her lips, and the gladness with which she welcomed the prayers of those who ministered unto her will long be remembered.

Miss St. Clair was no ordinary woman. Only twenty years of age she had lectured before public assemblies during five years over 1,000 times. Her personal appearance was attractive and lovable; and although her duties called her upon the platform, in her private capacity she was gentle, womanly and fascinating.

When smitten with the destroyer she was en route for California, Oregon and Columbia, with the intention of returning next fall via Montana.

To the praise of our people her father wishes us to state that for eight weeks the assiduity of the "Mormon" ladies in laboring at her bedside, and the prominent citizens in furnishing her with delicacies, in short their most self-sacrificing efforts for her recovery are the most remarkable we ever heard of, and for which he desires us to express his heartfelt gratitude.

LEVAN.—Br. James Wilson, writing from Levan, near Chicken Creek, on the 23rd, says: "This place was first settled last March, by a number of the old settlers from Chicken Creek, under the direction and counsel of Br. Erastus Snow. We have a beautiful location for a city. Good fruit raises tell us we can raise all kinds of fruit here. Nearly all the settlers have put out fruit trees and they grow finely. There is an abundance of range for stock, timber is near by, and we have every facility for raising a large and prosperous settlement. Br. Samuel Pitchforth, of Nephi, is our President. He is doing all he can to build up the place and invite good Latter-day Saints here. We have about twenty-five families here at present. The town is laid off in blocks 28 rods square, principal streets eight rods wide, cross streets six rods wide. Our farming land is below the town. We have a day school here, under the direction of one of our sisters; an evening school under the direction of Br. Isaac Pierce; and a Sunday school, under the superintendence of Br. James Wilson and Br. Isaac Pierce. All is peace, and good feelings prevail in this settlement.

We feel the want of a Post Office very much. We cannot get our papers regularly; sometimes we get them when it is a week old and sometimes not at all."

DIED.—In the 14th Ward, on Thursday night, January 28th, at a quarter to eleven o'clock, of scarlet fever, after a short illness, William Russell, son of Judge William I. and Mary Young Appleby, aged 4 years 3 months and 28 days.

LEGISLATIVE.

COUNCIL.—A motion that the committee on Municipal Corporations and Town Sites, be instructed to inquire into the expediency of reporting a general bill for the incorporation of towns in the Territory, was read, and a motion to refer it to the appropriate committee was negatived.

A CRYING EVIL.—A young man with a load of coal made his appearance on the market yesterday, and in answer to an inquiry from a citizen, he said his load weighed 2,300, and he wanted thirty-five dollars for it. The would-be purchaser agreed to give him thirty-five dollars per ton—being more than he demanded if he would only have it weighed. To this the honest vendor objected, saying he never sold by weight, but by the load only. This practice, on the part of vendors of wood, coal, hay and other produce, is becoming a crying evil, and we think something should be done by the municipal authorities to put a stop to such dishonesty and compel all persons bringing produce to have it weighed or measured when sold.
