

FIVE BANDITS HOLD UP A TRAIN.

Dynamited Express Car Without
Detaching it and Blew in
End of Coach.

ROBBERS SECURED NOTHING.

Men Seemed to be Amateurs—Pass-
engers Not Molested—Posse and
Dogs Sent in Pursuit.

Houston, Texas, July 15.—Train No. 5 on the International & Great Northern was held up tonight at Keechi, a small station about 30 miles west of Palestine. There were five bandits in the party, all young men and apparently very much amateurs. They dynamited the express car without detaching it from the train and blew in the end of the second class coach, but without injuring any of the passengers. One of the robbers was apparently badly hurt as the explosion appeared to be premature and he was observed to be covered with blood. The robbers secured nothing, not molesting either the express or the mail, and getting away as fast as possible after their comrade was hurt. Fireman Hiram Mize jumped from the locomotive as the train slowed down, then having been piled across the track, and hurt his shoulder, but not seriously. None of the passengers were molested. The adjutant general has been notified and a special train with Sheriff Henry Watts, his dogs and a posse left Palestine early this morning for the scene of the hold-up. A squad of rangers is stationed near the scene of the hold-up and it is probable that they will be put on the case at once. It is anticipated that arrests will be made shortly as the bandits are said to be country lads raised in the neighborhood.

HOLD-UP SUSPECT.

Spokane Police Believe They Have
A Northern Pacific Robber.

Spokane, Wash., July 15.—George Hammond, alias George Wilson, alias George Hamlin, suspected of being implicated in the Northern Pacific hold-up at Bear Mouth, Mont., is identified by Special Agent McFetridge of the Northern Pacific as having been convicted of robbing a sheepherder's camp in Montana, and also arrested in Montana last summer on suspicion of blowing up Northern Pacific bridges, but was released. McFetridge states: "I do not doubt in the least that he is the man we want." Hammond will probably be taken to Montana next week for trial.

RAILROAD TICKET SWINDLE.

A Gigantic One Is Discovered In
Denver.

Denver, Colo., July 15.—A gigantic railroad ticket swindle, through which the railroads having offices in Denver have lost thousands of dollars, has been unearthed, according to a secret agent of the Railroad Ticket Protective bureau, and action taken today is only the beginning of efforts to stamp out an alleged gang of ticket manipulators.

Three arrests were made today by Under Sheriff Felix O'Neill upon warrants sworn to by H. A. Koch and H. P. Carey, of a well-known detective agency, the names of the persons taken in custody being A. L. Hatch, B. E. Sisson and J. K. Roseneau. The latter is the manager of the Globe Ticket agency of this city, which, it is claimed, is owned by the two former.

These men are charged with having doctored Denver & Rio Grande and Burlington tickets by changing the destinations, plugging punched holes in cancelled tickets and otherwise changing them. A quantity of rubber stamps, acids for obliterating ink marks and other material said to have been used in altering tickets were found by the officers.

FOUR PEOPLE DROWNED.

Were Out Rowing and Got too
Near Mill Dam.

Pittsburg, Kan., July 15.—Four persons, all of this city, were drowned tonight in Spring river, 18 miles east of here.

MAYOR JONES' FUNERAL.

Was the Largest Ever Held in
Toledo.

Toledo, Ohio, July 15.—The funeral of Mayor Samuel M. Jones, this afternoon, was the largest ever held in Toledo. While the body lay in state, it was viewed by 100,000 people. The city is draped in mourning, and this afternoon there was a general suspension of business, all public offices, stores, factories and saloons being closed. A death mask of the mayor was made last night.

Among the distinguished persons who attended the services were Mayor Tom L. Johnson and a party of Cleveland public officials, and N. O. Nelson, millionaire manufacturer and philanthropist, of St. Louis and California. The services at the house were simple. One of the eulogists was Brand Whitlock, novelist and social reformer. A feature of the services was the reading of Mayor Jones' favorite poem from Walt Whitman's "Leaves of Grass." Burial was at Woodlawn cemetery.

POISONED HER CHILD.

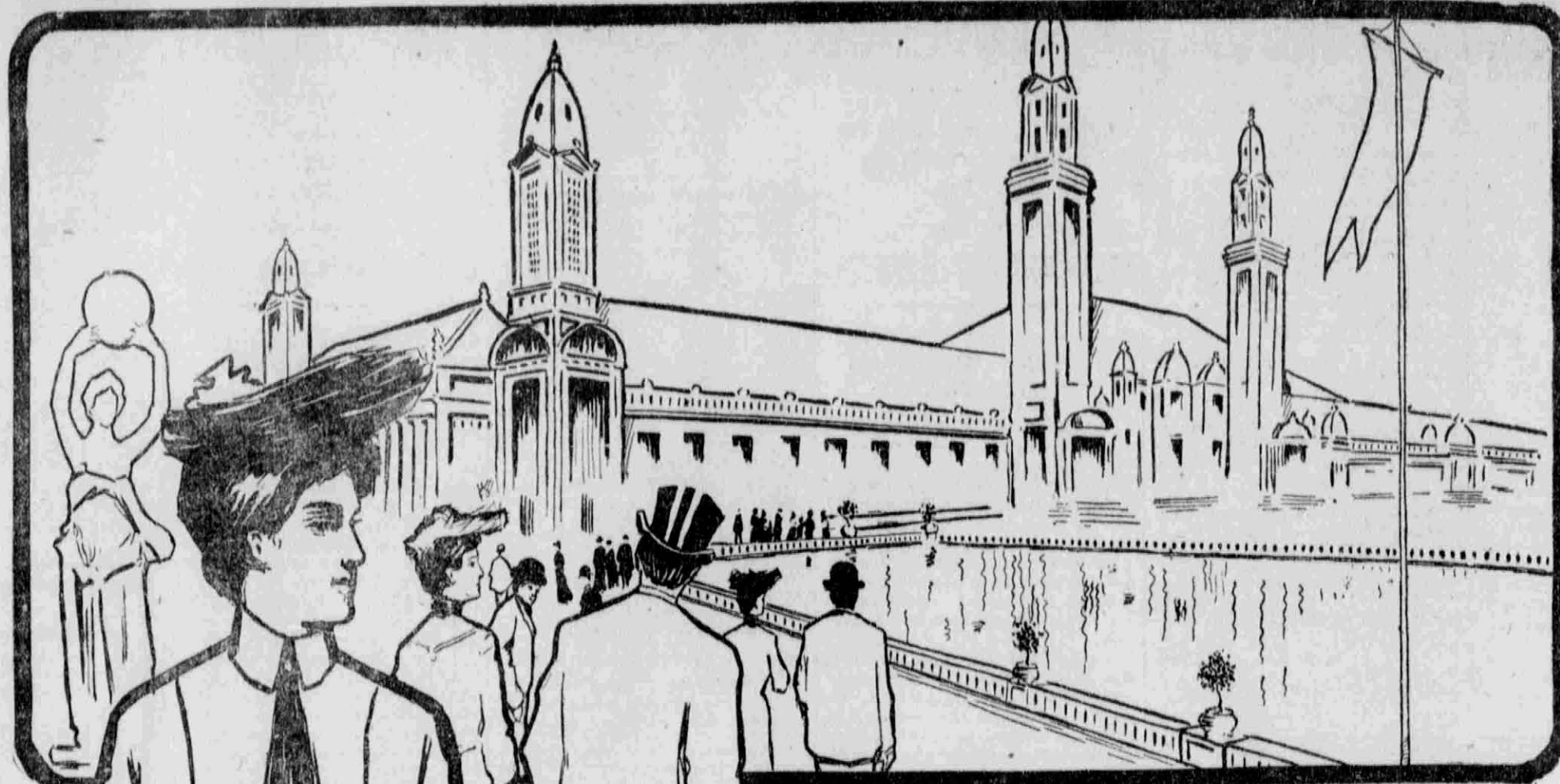
Subsequently Unnatural Mother
Committed Suicide.

Everett, Wash., July 15.—News has been received here from Machias that Mrs. Jennie Holcomb committed suicide at that place yesterday by shooting herself through the head with a revolver. On her dress was pinned a note confessing her guilt of the murder of her child by means of poison. The child died July 11 and owing to the peculiar circumstances surrounding its death, the coroner's jury investigated with the result that suspicion attached to Mrs. Holcomb. Fearing arrest, she committed suicide. The father of the child is said to be in Spokane.
