"We remarked some days ago that it would be useless for the Mormons of Utah to make a Constitution unless it should centain an article absolutely forbidding polygamy within the bonndaries of the proposed State. That seems to have been the opinion of a committee of the convention, which

reported yesterd ay an article embody-ing the suggested prohibition, fixing penalties for the violation, of it, and providing that the article shall never changed without the approval Congress. The nation will with some curiesity await the convention's action upon this proposition. The convention is composed entirely of delegates representing the Mormon party. Residents of the Territory who were not Mormons were cordially in-vited to take part in the movement but they stood aloef."

On the same subject the Charleston West Virginia) Star got off the following:

"The Mormons of Utah are holding a convention to formulate a constitution preparatory to becoming a State. The most important and advanced move-. nt, is the adoption of an article which reads: Bigamy and polygamy being con-

sidered incompatible with a republican form of government, each of them is hereby forbidden and declared a misdemeanor. Any person who shall violate this section shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000, and by imprisonment for a term not less than six months nor more than three years, in the discretion of the court. This section shall be construed as operative without the aid of legislation, and the offences prohibited by this section shall not be barred by any statute of limitation within three years after the commission of the offense, nor the power of pardon extend thereto until such pardon shall have been approved by the President of the United States." With such a provision in the con-stitution we do not see how Congress can refuse to embody Utah in the great

Prospects for the future are bright, and we anticipate more baptisms in the future, that is if you will allow us to "build castles in the air." We feel encouraged in our labors and never airaid of the Kingdom being

given to another people through ex-ternal causes.


