LOCAL BRIEFS.

Ill with Typhoid—Edward Fier is in Holy Cross hospital with typhoid fever.

Dies in New York—Word has been received here of the death in New York, of Benjamin Wechsler, aged 81, formerly a resident of this city.

Washburn Clerk Dead—John C. Washburn of Denver, head clerk of the Woodmen of the World, and a brother of Mrs. W. E. Block of this city, is dead.

Address Sale—Miss Chas.—The sale of the property of Miss Chas. was addressed last evening by O. E. Sterling of San Francisco, E. M. Syder of Philadelphia and Oscar Gnoschke of this city.

Interment at Chicago—The remains of Mrs. A. Christman who died in Little Cottonwood canyon Monday last have been shipped to Chicago for interment. Mr. Christman accompanying the body.

Demand for Locomotive—The demand for locomotives has increased in the recent order placed by the New York Central lines for 200 with the American Locomotive company. The Delaware & Hudson has ordered 20 engines, and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul has ordered 50.

It was decided to continue the sessions of the moot court, which were suspended last year. The remaining court officers will be selected later.

Change in Bird Funeral—Funeral services over the remains of the late Henry M. Bird of Murray will be held in the home of Mrs. Bird at Murray, Friday, Oct. 25, at 12 m., instead of in the south Cottonwood meetinghouse as heretofore announced. The change will enable many of Mr. Bird's friends from the city to attend the last sad rites.

Water in the Milk—City Chemist Helms analyzed four samples of milk offered for sale by the Empire, A. B. C. Pentrose and Sego Lids dairies yesterday and found them to be below the standard as required by law. The owners of these dairies have been notified of the conditions found in making the tests and some legal action will probably be taken against them.

Death of Mrs. Gulbransen—Mrs. Elizabeth Gulbransen, mother of Charles and Fred Gulbransen of the fire department, Nick Gulbransen, a police officer, Mrs. C. M. Hansen and Mrs. M. Amundsen, died yesterday at her late home, 1114 South Main street, after a long illness. She was 72 years of age.

State Land Approved—The general land office at Washington has approved 18,298 acres of land in this state since last May, and those desirous of purchasing are receiving certificates. Under the terms of the certificates, a purchaser must pay a certain installment on the lands, and should he fail to make regular payments, the title to the property reverts to the state and the money already paid goes into the state treasury.

Church Plans Accepted—At last night's meeting of the First Baptist church, the plans for the new church were examined and formally accepted. Red brick was decided upon, and the idea of a gallery, social lobby and a gymnasium was accepted. A resolution was received from the home missionary society stating that the gift mortgage held by it of \$15,000 on the old church property had been received. The new church will have a capacity of the new edifice will be 1,148.

Careless Hunters—Pearl, the 12-year-old daughter of Victor Arlington of Sandy, was shot by a careless hunter, while she was standing in the yard near her father's house. She was hit in the face and neck by half a dozen shot, and the missiles were not so far from the center that they did not penetrate through the outer flesh. The wounds inflicted are not necessarily serious, but are very painful. The man who fired the shot could not be found, but he believed that carelessness rather than criminality is responsible for the shooting.

Assassins to be Shot—According to advices received from Guanajuato, Mexico, the murderers of George Moore, formerly a Salt Lake laborer, will soon pay the penalty of their crime. All have made confessions and have been sentenced to be shot. Their names are: Antonio, a Mexican, Cirillo Rico and Julio Nieto. Mrs. Rose, who was a Miss McGrath of this city, was severely wounded at the time her husband was killed. She is now here with her mother and sister and has recovered from the injuries received at the hands of the Mexican bandits.

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GOLDFIELD BANK CLOSURE.

State Bank & Trust Co. Officials, However, Claim It is Solvent.

(Special to the "News.") Goldfield, Oct. 23.—The State Bank and Trust company of this city owned and controlled by T. H. Ricker, closed its doors today. It is said to be solvent, although holding considerable securities of the defunct Sullivan Trust company. Branches at Tonopah, Manassas, Sandy City and Blair are also closed. J. P. Marshall, former state bank examiner, declared the Goldfield bank solvent only a short time ago. The Nye & Ormsby county bank experienced a run when the news spread and it is believed its doors will remain closed until the fight has passed. Later trouble was blamed for the closing which is explained as temporary only. Collections were slow and the drain on the branches of the institution brought about the tightness. The mining companies with deposits in the State bank had to suspend operations and 500 men are out of work until it is opened. The state auditors have declared their confidence in the institution and will stand by it.
