

# MISTAKEN FOR BELLE GUNNESS

Mrs. Cora B. Heeren Sues N. Y. Central for Thirty Thousand Dollars For Damages.

TAKEN OFF TRAIN AT UTICA.

Ray Lamphere's Trial Begins—Letters Of Famous Murders Will Be Read—Jury Not Complete.

New York, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Cora B. Heeren has brought suit against the New York Central railway asking \$30,000 damages because, as she alleges, she was mistaken for Mrs. Belle Gunness, the Laporte, Ind., murderess, and taken from the train near Utica, N. Y., last summer. Her mother, it is said, who was with her at the time, has filed suit for a similar amount for alleged indignities to which she was subjected, Mrs. Heeren, who lives in Brooklyn, declares that she suffered such a shock that she has never recovered.

RAY LAMPHERE'S TRIAL.

Laporte, Ind., Nov. 11.—For the purpose of rendering every assistance possible to the authorities in their efforts to unravel the great Gunness mystery, A. K. Helgelein, brother of Andrew Helgelein, the last known victim of Mrs. Gunness, arrived in Laporte today from Aberdeen, S. D. He will be one of the main witnesses for the state, for through him Prosecutor Smith will introduce a number of letters received by him from Mrs. Gunness during the time that Mrs. Helgelein was endeavoring to find some trace of his brother. Mrs. Gunness claimed that the brother, after visiting her, had gone to Norway on a trip. At the time she wrote his dismembered body lay in her private cemetery, where she had buried it after securing the \$30,000 which he had drawn from this Aberdeen bank through a Laporte bank.

These letters were all written in Norwegian, for Mrs. Gunness could not write English, and in them are many references to Lamphere, of whom she was jealous because of her relationship with her children, and of Lamphere's jealousy because Andrew Helgelein had been a guest at her home. She refers to Lamphere as "that crazy Lamphere" and "that jealous Lamphere." It is considered by the state that in the letters of Mrs. Gunness to A. K. Helgelein it has evidence of a strong, possible motive to support the theory that Lamphere, jealous of Helgelein's attentions and angered because he thought that he had been supplanted in the affections of the widow, assisted the widow in putting Helgelein out of the way, and that afterward he became revengeful upon her, setting fire to her house.

With 10 jurors tentatively accepted by the sides, court adjourned this afternoon until tomorrow morning in order that a fourth special panel of 25 veniremen could be summoned. The 10 men accepted are all farmers, and date 37 talesmen have been examined and 77 of these have been either excused for cause or peremptorily challenged and excused.

In offering evidence, Prosecutor Smith announced tonight that his program was to place first on the stand Coroner C. S. Mack, and to follow him with Dr. C. S. Wilcox, Dr. J. L. Gray, Dr. J. H. Williams, and Dr. H. H. Long. Through Coroner Mack and the physicians facts learned at the inquest will be brought out.

Reports that additional skeletons had been found at the Gunness farm have been in circulation on the streets, but their stories have arisen from the fact that K. M. Hudson, one of the chief witnesses for the defense, had several days ago picked up some bones, which are declared by experts to be those of a dead hog.

IMMEDIATE REVISING OF TARIFF SCHEDULES WANTED

Washington, Nov. 11.—An immediate revision of the tariff schedules affecting articles that are alleged to be sold by American manufacturers in foreign markets at lower prices than in this country was urged in behalf of the interests of the American farmers by former Gov. N. J. Bachelder of New Hampshire, national master, in his annual address today before the National Grange, Patrons of Husbandry.

Mr. Bachelder also made a strong plea for postal savings banks, parcels post and highway appropriations at the next session of Congress. Commenting upon the purpose of President Roosevelt's country life commission Mr. Bachelder stated that the commission already has ascertained from letters sent by farmers in every part of the United States that the reform means more to the farmers in dollars and cents than adequate appropriation made for the improvement of highways made.

THAT LABOR DINNER.

Official Statement Issued from White House Regarding its Character.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The discussion which has arisen over the dinner which President Roosevelt is to give in the White House next Tuesday to a number of labor leaders brought forth from the executive office of the president today an official statement, pointing out that the dinner is not an official one and declining to discuss the omission of President Gompers, Vice President O'Connell, Secy. Morrison and Treasurer Lennon of the American Federation of Labor from the guest list.

"As the statement has been made that this is an official dinner, it is worth while pointing out that it is nothing of the kind. The president has on several different occasions had various labor leaders, with whom he has been in contact, and whose views he wished to obtain, at dinner. For this occasion he had asked a number of men within and without government service who are well known in different phases of the labor question to come to dinner. Three-fourths of these men are not members of labor organizations. Six or eight of them are connected in one character or another with the work of labor organizations. It would be of course, absurd to take any notice of any discussion as to who should or who should not be invited to dinner by the president."

TO PREVENT LITIGATION.

Before Committing Suicide Albert Berger Threw Money in Stove.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 11.—Albert Berger, a former Alaska miner, just before committing suicide at Canyon Ferry, last night, threw \$2,000 in post-office money orders payable to himself, in the stove, declaring that the money was in the hands of the government and no one would quarrel over it after he was dead.

The last time Berger was in Helena he had plenty of money. He brought in several hundred dollars' worth of gold, which he had taken from his mine near Canyon Ferry. Trouble with neighbors is believed to have caused insanity. For some time he had been threatening to kill himself, and tried to trade his horse and buggy to a carpenter whom he desired to make his coffin.

He has relatives in Germany, but none here.

REICHSTAG REJECTS ADDRESS TO EMPEROR

Berlin, Nov. 11.—An exciting debate in the reichstag was concluded this evening with the rejection by a majority of a proposition to send an address to the emperor calling attention to the danger of his majesty's personal intervention in foreign politics. The discussion brought forth strong expressions from the representatives of most of the parties.

The displeasure of the house was concentrated principally upon Chancellor von Buelow. Members of several of the groups refused to accept the chancellor's explanation with regard to the emperor's interview in the London Daily Telegraph as satisfactory or as offering guarantees for the future, but when the proposition of addressing the emperor formally on the subject was put to the house, the government majority did not hesitate in voting against it.

Chancellor von Buelow listened unmoved virtually throughout the afternoon to personal attacks against him only leaving the house for a short time to attend the sitting of the Prussian

cabinet. It was generally expected that he would speak again today, but he refrained from doing so.

Baron von Kiderlen-Waechter's defense of the foreign office, which was so closely identified with the "inter-view," was received with loudly expressed derision by the Socialists.

It was said today that the emperor was receiving a full stenographic report of the proceedings at Donatus' home, where he is the guest of Prince von Fuerstenberg.

SOUTH DAKOTA DIVORCES.

New Law Which Will Cripple Industry Gets Majority.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 11.—Contrary to every expectation, the voters of Minnesota county last week returned a majority of 747 for the new law, which will cripple the South Dakota divorce industry centered in this county. The official count was made today.

IMPORTERS LOSE CASE.

Sent Their Protest by Telephone Instead of in Writing.

New York, Nov. 12.—Because a firm of importers of this city made their protest to the customs house by telephone instead of in writing, they have lost their case before the board of appeals. In dismissing the protest Judge Somerville said:

"The report of the collector in this case shows that the importers offered verbally to abandon the merchandise by telephone. The verbal abandonment, in our opinion, was insufficient. The established practice is the contrary and any other rule would lead to uncertainty in customs administration, as well as to embarrassing litigation."

BIG ORDER FOR PULLMANS.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—A \$1,000,000 order for new Pullman coaches is being placed for use on limited trains between San Francisco and Portland and

Los Angeles has been placed by the officials of the Southern Pacific company, according to a communication made today. The order provides for 20 cars and is said to be due to the increased traffic. Another large order is to be made for passenger coaches.

MADAME LEROY.

Chicago Police Trying to Identify Woman Mentioned by Mrs. Reed.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—Chicago police are endeavoring to identify the Mme. Leroy, a clairvoyant, alleged to have "controlled" Mrs. Allen F. Reed, who attempted to extort money from Mrs. Genevieve Chandler Phillips under threat of death by dynamite in Denver. Mme. Leroy is thought by Denver police to be Madeline Leroy Langley, alias Madeline Thompson, alias Mamie Starr.

"I recall the woman known as Mamie Starr," said Lieut. of Detectives Andy Rohan of Chicago. "She was a servant in the Newlands family on the South Side about 17 years ago. After eating dinner one day, all the family were taken sick with symptoms of poisoning. A physician discovered that rat poisoning had been cooked in some kind of food. He reported the matter to the police and the house was searched."

"A box of rat poison, which it was afterward proved, was purchased by the servant, was found."

"There were four or five persons in the family, and one of them died from the effects of the poison. The Starr woman at that time was about 20 years old. Her defense, I think, was insanity. She never had been in any police trouble before."

"She was convicted and sentenced to prison for life. Through the efforts of some prominent women, who took an interest in her, she was pardoned after serving a few years in prison. I learned after her release that she drifted out to Denver."

TO UNDO BY PETITION WHAT WAS DONE BY VOTE

Portland, Or., Nov. 12.—Opponents of "statement No. 1," will today take their first step in the effort to nullify the popular nomination of George E. Chamberlain for United States senator. This is to be done by circulation of petition for signature by the electorate of the state asking the members of the legislature to repeal a Republican law of the opponents of the statement that if a majority of the voters sign the petition, it will ask the legislature to signers of "statement No. 1."

"I do not believe that there is any truth in it."

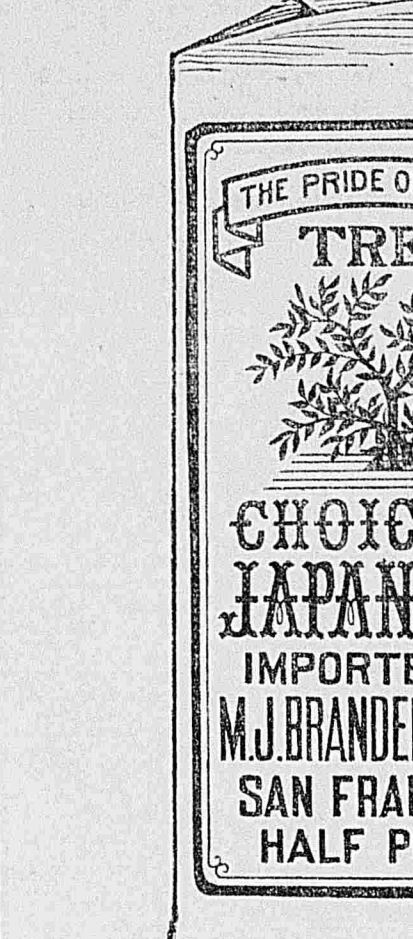

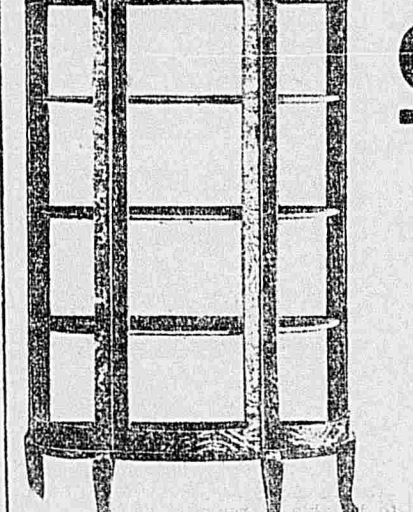
