

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

FROM MONDAY'S DAILY.

STREET RAILROAD.—The laying of the track for the street railroad will commence to-morrow morning. A short temporary track was put down to day inside and a short distance east of the depot yard for the purpose of running the iron to the terminus of the line.

FLOODED.—We learn that a portion of the Fifth Ward has been inundated by the overflowing of the mountain streams, whose volume has been greatly increased by melting snows. Fortunately but little damage has been done to property by the flood.

RETURNED FROM UTAH.—Mr. Daniel W. Jones returned from his trip to the Utah Indian reservation on Saturday night. He came on ahead of his outfit, which he left on the divide in good hands. It is expected to arrive here in four or five days. The Indians are still peaceably disposed.

MAY PARTY AT SPRINGVILLE.—Brother C. D. Evans writes that the Sabbath school children and a large number of the bigger folks had a gay time at Springville on May day. There was a procession, with music, banners, &c. The pathway of the children was strewn with flowers at different points. After a variety of ceremonies and exercises, including the coronation of the May queen, the whole party partook of a splendid repast, the affair concluding with dancing and sportive games.

RETURNED.—Elder J. M. Ballinger, of Pleasant Grove, arrived this morning, on his return from his mission East. He labored in the State of Iowa, where he was universally well treated and had taken advantage of many opportunities of conversing upon the principles of truth. Five persons, four of them in the church, came with him on his return.

A GOOD PLACE.—Brother James Farmer writes from Monroe settlement, Sevier Co., May 1st, that much plowing and sowing is being done there. There is neither profanity nor drunkenness in that locality, and the people are all engaged in minding their own business. There is still a large quantity of good land that could be brought under cultivation, upon which good people are invited to settle. A large irrigating canal is in course of construction, which will take in a wide area of country.

SAM GILLSON ARRESTED.—Sam, Gilson, ex-bailiff of the late illegal grand jury, was arrested this morning on the strength of an affidavit made on Saturday by one John Thomas, who states that Gillson compelled him, by threatening to kill him, &c., to sign an affidavit for the purpose of charging the commission of crimes upon certain parties. After his arrest Gillson was taken before Justice Samuel W. Richards, who bound him over in \$500 bonds, to appear for examination at the City Hall to-morrow at 10 a. m. The affidavit made on Saturday was attested by J. W. Stainbourn, Notary Public, of this City.

GEORGE MOSIER.—Information is wanted concerning a gentleman of that name by his brother, Daniel Mosier. The latter informs us that he has had no tidings of his brother for twenty-four years; that period having elapsed since he removed from Missouri to Iowa, leaving his brother George behind. A report had reached him, however, that, about four or five years since, George had come out to the Rocky Mountains and become identified with the Latter-day Saints. UTTERLY UNRELIABLE.—The following expression, made by Hon. Mr. Sargent, of California, in the House of Representatives, April 27th, as reported in the *Congressional Globe*, serves to show the estimation in which certain dispatches from Salt Lake are held in Congress—

"Now, I wish to say with reference to the press dispatches from San Francisco, which I hold in my hands, that they are utterly unreliable. It could not reasonably be expected under the circumstances, well known to myself, and in view of the authorship of those dispatches, and their *animus*, that they would be any more reliable upon this question than would be a dispatch from Salt Lake on the Mormon question."

DIED.

In Tooele City, April 10th, of old age, Elder PETER MCINTYRE.

He was born March 17, 1790, at Succoth, parish of Strathure, Cowell, Argyleshire, Scotland. At the age of eighteen he entered the British army, joining the 91st regiment of Highlanders, and in 1809 took part in the famous Walcheren expedition. July 1813 he took part in the battle of Victoria, and a few days after, in the battle near Plampona. He was also in the battle of Toulouse, and other engagements. He and his regiment participated in most of the battles which followed the escape from Elba and resulted in the overthrow of Napoleon, and were with the allied army at the surrender of Paris.

Bro. McIntyre was baptized in Greenock in 1842 or '43, and being ordained an Elder, carried the gospel into the Highlands and surrounding country. In 1853 he emigrated to this Territory and died full of faith in the gospel.—*COM.*
