Miss Anna Beech Will Not Incrim inate Pesco on Witness Stand.

Ogden, March 31 .-- Joseph Pesco appeared before Judge Murphy yesterday for preliminary hearing on the charge of attempting to criminally assault Miss Anna E. Beech on the night of March 12. The court, however, did not de-sire to dismiss the suit at once, so took the matter under advisement. Miss Beech on the witness stand testified that when she signed the complaint she thought it was a bond for Pesco's release; that he had not attempted to assault her and she did not want him proscuted. assault her and she did hot testimony prosecuted. Her sister gave testimony to the same effect. The court held that the witness, Mas Beech, had "perpertated the rank-est kind of perjury and it was a shameful showing that the witness should so perjure herself.'
