GIVING MONEY AWAY.

In a month the residents of Sait Lake City pay for \$15,000 worth of Lake City pay for \$15,000 worth of builter which they do not get on ac-count of the short weight, according to figures compiled by City Pood in-spector Waiter J. Fragier and Willard Hanson, state food and dairy commis-sioner. This amounts to \$180,000 a year, or about \$500 a day. The builter contamption of Sait Lake amounts to about 500,000 pounds. On a motifuly busis the consumers pay for \$7,500 pounds of builter which they do not get, on account of the short weight. This raises the price of builter to about
