Vessels at Mare Island Are to be Completed Immediately. TO EMPLOY EXTRA MEN. Trouble Brewing in Honduras As signed as Reason for the Hurry-Washington Sends Oat Calmers,

-Rush orders have been received from Washington ordering that all work on vessels now in the navy yard be completed with the greatest possible dispatch. In view of this order an extra force of men will be employed at once and a night force was inaugurated last night to complete the repairs on the United States steamship Bennington, which is practically ready for service. Several other vessels can be made ready for sea within a short time. Large quantities of stores were shipped to San Francisco today, to be transferred o the Boston, the New York and the Ranger, now lying at anchor in the harbor. It is understood here that the
