STRIPPED OF

Policeman Stephen S. Walsh of New York is Degraded for Cowardice.

FROM BUILDING.

Commissioner Bingham Was Under Such Excitement That He Was Scarcely Able to Speak.

New York, July 31 .- A remarkable scene, closely paralelling that memorable one in Paris when Capt. Alfred Dreyfus was publicly degraded before the French army, was enacted in the trial room at police headquarters today. For the first time in more than 30 years a patrolman had been adjudged guilty of cowardice. He is Stephen S. Walsh, who, according to the chage made against him, last week fied from an armed man who had shot and killed a woman. The keen interest with which the unusual case was followed rose to a point of dramatic intensity when Police Commissioner Bingham, who had presided personally at the trial, announced in a voice choked with emotion that the charge against the unfortunate man had been

Then the commissioner turned to In-Then the commissioner turned to Inspector Richard Walsh, in whose district Stephen Walsh was a patrolman, but who is no relative of the dismissed man, and directed the inspector to strip Walsh of his shield and uniform buttons, so that he might not even leave the trial room with the emblems of his former position as a policeman in good standing on his person. The crowd looked on in wonder and excitement as the inspector advanced to perform his unpleasant task. The dismissed man stood still and offered no resistance as the shield was unpinned from his breast, but when the inspector started to detach the buttons of the uniform. Stephen Walsh stepped back and appealed to his attorney against any further humiliation being put upo a him in the presence of his former comrades.

Commissioner Bingham, who was laboring under great excitement, then interposed and directed the inspector to conduct his former subordinate to the steps of the police building and eject him. Stephen Walsh offered no resistance, and went with the inspector to the outer doorway, where he was formally directed to leave the building. Throughout the unusual proceeding Stephen Walsh maintained his composure.

As Stephen Walsh was being escorted from the room, Commissioner Bingham, with a wave of his hand, indicated that he desired the other men in uniform to remain. "Come up close in front, all you men in uniform," said the commissioner, in a voice husky with feeling, while his eyes brimmed with tears. "I have a word to say to you all, but I can scarcely say it. Mycheeks have burned with shame here even to think of a charge of cowardice being preferred against a man in this department. It has been our pride to say that, whatever other faults there may have been, there was no cowardice in this department. I gave the accused in this case every chance to defend himself, but it has been clearly proven that he failed just at the moment when he should not have failed. This thing must never happen again while you and I are together. You must forget this, but you must remember the proud record of 30 years before when not one man in the many thousands failed to do his duty in the face of danger."

Stephen Walsh was one of the two Stephen Walsh was one of the two men against whom a charge of cowardice was made last week when Frank Warner was permitted to escape after killing Esther Norling. Before Warner was captured he shot and mortally wounded John C. Wilson, and terrorized hundreds of persons. Patrolman Roosa, the officer whose name was coupled with that of Walsh in the cowardice charge, was exonerated after a full hearing before the commissioner. Warner, who once was a prosperoughatter, but had suffered business reverses, went to the store where Miss Norling, who had once been his cashler, was employed, and shot her to Dr. Lyon's

Other policemen, including Roosa, soon arrived on the scene, but Warner escaped. Two hours later he walked into Wilson's store and shot him in the back. Wilson died several days later in a hospital. DENMARK AND ICELAND.

King Frederick Announces His Policy

Towards the Latter.

Reyjavik, Iceland, July 31.—At a banquet given in his honor, last night, King Frederick of Denmark, who, accompanied by Prince Harald, Premier Christensen, and 40 members of the rigsdag, arrived here yesterday, announced his policy regarding the future relations between the Danish crown and Iceland.

"I have inherited the kingdom as a unit," said King Frederick, "and as such it shall remain from generation to generation, but I have also inherited from my father the tradition that the Icelanders are to be a free peoplee who cooperate with the king in framing the laws under which they are to live. I have therefore established a commission consisting of members of the Danish rigadga and the Icelandic althing, to arrange for legislation to define the constitutional position of Iceland in the realm and to find a form under which the freedem of Iceland may be built up and protected while at the same time the unity of the realm is preserved and insured."



Letters of Millionaire Cocy Read at Inquest-Show He Was in Love With Her.

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 31 .-All suspicion against Amos R. Rumbaugh, as the slayer of Miss Laura Matthews, was removed through the verdict of the coroner's jury this after-

The verdict reads as follows: "We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of the death of Laura Matthews, find that she came

to her death from gunshot wounds inflicted with suicidal intent."

The verdict was rendered this afternoon at 2:45, after the jury had been out exactly 30 minutes.

An inquest was later held over the remains of Amos R. Rumbaugh, who shot himself through the head yesternoon. The variety was that shot himself through the head yester-day afternoon. The verdict was that he came to his death by his own hand. Suspicion for a time pointed to Rum-baugh as having caused the death of Miss Matthews, because of his appar-ent infatuation for the young woman and his failure to appear at the in-

and his failure to appear at the in-quest as a witness.

Miss Tillie Green of Scotville, Mich.,
who was Miss Matthew's nurse and
whose effects had been held by the
authorities pending developments, is
declared in no way to blame for the
young woman's rash act.

Miss Green testified that C. A. Coey,
the wealthy Chicago automobile deal-

the wealthy Chicago automobile deal-er, had sent several telegrams since the tragedy, one of which reads as

"Will meet you at train. Forward letters. Keep your own counsel." The witness admitted receiving \$245

The witness admitted receiving \$245 from Coey yesterday.

Miss Green testified that Rumbaugh on Monday told her that he and Laura had been driving in a closed carriage on Friday, and that after Laura had disclosed to him her relations with Coey she suddenly drew a revolver and attempted to shoot herself. Rumbaugh wrested the pistol from her. Rumbaugh also told Miss Green that he and Miss Matthews had determined to marry and go abroad. Rumbaugh had engaged a section in a Pullman for himself and Miss Matthews and they were were to leave for New York they were were to leave for New York Monday. The nurse said Rumbaugh was very

much agitated when told of Miss Mat-thews' death and talked excitedly about going east and taking revenge

Miss Green said she had no desire o withhold any information from the

After identifying a large bundle of letters written by Coey to Miss Matthews she was excused. These letters have not been made public but are said to be moderate in tone and indictate that Coey and Miss Matthews were very intimate. They were addressed "Dear Girl," "Dear Little Laura" and "My Dear Laura."

Several telegrams were also offered in evidence.

in evidence. One letter begins: "Find enclosed \$50," another "Your loving letter received."

The coroner, when asked as to the The coroner, when asked as to the nature of the letters, said they were of a character which does not reflect seriously upon Mr. Coey.

Bell boy C. L. Kingsbury, of the Acacia hotel, was the next witness called. He testified that on Sunday afternoon he overheard a telephone conversation between a man and Miss

as the conversation ended, but over-heard the man say: "Kill you from ambush." Miss Matthews said, "What?" and the man repeated what he had said.

Several other witnesses were called ut added nothing new. Recess was then taken until 1:30 p.

m.
At the opening of the afternoon session of the coroner's inquest, the letters written by millionaire Coey of Chicago, to Miss Matthews, were read to the jury. The letters indicate that Coey was deeply in love with Miss Matthews at the time of writing. They abound with protestations of love, and are written in a manner calculated to carry with them conviction of the sincerity of the writer.

Such phrases as "I cannot get along without you," "I will live for you, if you live for me," and "life is short—so why not be with the ones we love the most," are incorporated in the letters.

In nearly every letter Coey encouraged Miss Matthews to be "a good little girl," and come back to him with health restored.

Amos R. Rumbaugh, who shot himself here late yesterday rather than testify at the inquest over the body of Miss Laura Matthews, his friend, died early this morning at the St. Francis beautiful.

BELIEVE GIRL WAS MURDERED.

Chicago, July 31.—C. A. Coey, who has been prominently mentioned in the developments following the suicide of Laura Matthews at Colorado Springs, held a conference today with Mrs. Jennie Matthews, the mother of the girl, arrived here today from Kansas City. At the conclusion of their interview, both of them declared that in their opinion the girl had been murdered. Coey said he had traced the telegram said to have been sent to him by Miss Green, the nurse of Miss Matthews, and was satisfied that she did not send it. He further said:

"I believe that Miss Matthews' death is a plain case of murder. In my opininon Rumbaugh committed the deed and sent a telegram calculated to cast suspicion on me as being the cause of the girl's death. About 10 days ago I wrote Miss Matthews a cheerful letter and she was talking of returning to Chicago. Rumbaugh was evidently afraid of losing the girl."

Mrs. Matthews absolutely refused to accept the theory of suicide. An hour before receiving the telegram announcing the girl's death, she had received a letter from her daughter, which was evidently written while in good spirits. The girl speke of starting for Chicago within a short time, and stopping at Kansas City for a visit.

Amos R. Rumbaugh met Laura Matthews in Chicago two years ago while there on a business trip and fell desperately in love with her. He did not tell the girl that he was married, and she did not discover it for several months. In the meantime, he showered costly presents upon her and did everything to win her. "I will get a divorce and we will marry," he told her. Miss Matthews accepted his attentions, but told him she expected some day to marry Charles E. Coey. Rumbaugh persisted in his attentions and began neglecting his wife and business to go to Chicago and visit the young dramatic student.

Two weeks ago Rumbaugh went to Chicago, where he learned that Miss

Matthews had gone to Colorado. He wrote a letter to his business partner in Mount Pleasant, saying that he was going west and would probably never return. Then he boarded a train for Colorado Springs to join Miss Matthews.
