A DANGEROUS SPORT.

Hammer Throwing Frequently Results In Fatal Accidents.

The terrible injury that befell John J. Walsh, the veteran official of the Pastime Athletic club at Jamestown, brings to mind what a very dangerous pastime hammer-throwing is. It has often been remarked that some day the games of the New York A. C. at Travers Island would be marked by a terrible accident

Dozens of times ornerals of the New York Athletic club lawn have escaped by inches. A thousand times everything will go off well, but the 1,1001st time the wire will break (as it did at Jameslown), or one of the throwers will lose control of the missile, and then something awful will take place.

It is unfortunate that the hammer has to be thrown from a spot so near the dense crowd, as is the case at Travers Island, for in case of an accident a frail woman in the audience might just as well be the victim as a hardy and game man like Walsh. More office scares and narrow escapes have come from inattention on the part of officials and spectators than from nervousness of the throwers or defects in the hammer. It seems certain that while the big reliews are warming up with the discus, shot or the hammer, some absentminded persons must get right in the lien of fire and get clipped. A narrow escape of this sort takes all the nerve out of the weight-tosser and affects his work for weeks to come.

The only time in his life that Martin Sheridan was scared was at Travers Island last fall when the discus slipped from his grasp and struck one of the spectators on the shin bone. While the doctor was examining the injured man Sheridan stood by as white as a sheet.

Two deaths have been charged to hammer throwing in recent years. At a meet in New Haven the hammer knocked a board off a fence and the board in turn knocked down a spectator killing him instantly. In the other case the victim was struck by the missile itself and probably never knew what hit him.
