

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**PAROWAN SUNDAY SCHOOL.**—F. T. Whitney, Superintendent of the Parowan Sunday School, writes on the 18th ult: "Our school is well attended by nearly 150 scholars, and twenty teachers who take a lively interest in imparting to them a knowledge of letters and instructing them in the principles of eternal life. Our Sunday school party which came on the 30th day of December last, was really interesting. It commenced at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and was kept up till 9 o'clock in the evening, the amusements consisting of dancing, singing, etc. The sight of 300 children, all joyous with health and innocence, gave pleasure hard to be described."

We have received two interesting communications from Elder Edward Stevenson, which our limited space compels us to condense:

As Elder Nathan Porter and Elder Stevenson passed through Ogden on the 11th ult., it appeared alive in business, though one canvas tent, with a sign out of a tin shop, looked rather cold for the season. Held meeting in Willard in the evening, and next morning started for Wellsville, finding from a host to two feet of snow in the canyon. Preached in Wellsville on the evening of the 12th; the next day visited Hyrum and Milville, and on Friday held meeting at Providence, Logan, Hyde Park—where they found Elder Wm. Hyde recovering from a severe illness. Elder Hyde was visited and meetings held, an excellent spirit prevailing. On the return the weather, which had been quite cold, moderated and was quite pleasant. Meetings were held at various points on the return trip, which altogether occupied twenty days, during which twenty-three meetings were held.

LEGISLATIVE.

**HOUSE.**—The House resumed its sitting at 2 p. m. Quorum present.

A lengthy communication from Wm. Clayton, Auditor of Public Accounts, in relation to the Territorial taxes, was read, ordered printed and referred to the Committee on Revenue.

The Committee on Education reported back the bill amending the University charter, with amendments and recommended the passage of the same. The bill passed its final reading.

Mr. Cluff presented the petition of A. E. Hinkley and 170 others, citizens of Summit county, praying the Legislative Assembly to remove the county seat from Wanship to Coalville; read and referred.

Mr. Cluff also presented remonstrance of Henry W. Brizze and 140 others, citizens of Summit county, against the petition of A. E. Hinkley and others; read and referred.

The bill defining the duties of poundkeepers was taken up, and pending its second reading the House adjourned till tomorrow at 10 a. m.

**COUNCIL.**—C. P. No. 8, "an act for the incorporation of Public, Charitable, Scientific and Literary Institutions," was reported back from the Committee on Education, with slight amendments in phraseology, and its passage, as amended, recommended. It was laid on the table to come up in its order.

H. P. No. 14, an act to amend an ordinance entitled "an ordinance incorporating the University of the State of Deseret," was taken up on its first reading, and was referred to the Committee on Education.

H. P. No. 15, an act incorporating the Grantsville Library Association, was read the first time, and was referred to the Committee on Private Incorporations.

Councilor L. Snow, chairman of the Committee on Roads, recommended an appropriation of \$40,000 to the citizens of Washington county to defray the expense of work done on the road from Kanarrah to Remington.

**HOUSE.**—House met at 10 a. m.

Mr. Rockwood presented petition of Edward Hunter relative to appropriation to cancel indebtedness on the Salt Lake City and Wanship wagon road; which was read and referred to the Committee on Roads, etc.

On motion of Mr. Wm. R. Smith, the Committee on Roads, etc., were instructed to examine the Statutes, and the financial report of the several counties, with a view to ascertain if the parties having grants for toll bridges or other franchises complied with the provisions of the grants, and report thereon.

The committee on counties, to whom was referred the petition of A. E. Hinkley and 170 others, praying for the County Seat of Summit county to be removed from Wanship to Coalville, also the remonstrance of H. W. Brizze and others; having considered the same, reported a bill entitled "an Act changing the county seat of Summit county," which passed its three readings and was forwarded to the council for their action.

The bill of Thaddeus E. Fleming, Sheriff deputy of Utah county, for expenses incurred in the guarding and execution of C. E. Ottaway, alias Channey Millard amounting to \$381.30, was read and referred to committee.

Mr. J. F. Smith presented the bill of J. W. Fox, Surveyor General, amounting to \$145; read and referred to claims.

Morgan County financial report was read and referred.

The bill for an act defining the duties of Poundkeepers, and for other purposes, was taken up, pending the reading of which the House took a recess till 2 p. m.
