For the American Derby the handicapping will be done by a committee appointed by the directors of the New England Breeders' association. The handicapping will have to be distance and not by weight, as with the runners, as weight makes little difference in the sulky. Just how much has never been satisfactorily determined, but from the fact that the average owner ways little attention to the weight of his driver, so long as he is skilful, it is evident that the weight that would anchor a runner makes little or no difference with the trotter. Whatever difference there is undoubtedly is more than equalized by the heavier driver being better able to hold and help his horse.

In the American Trotting Derby a distance of 50 feet will be allowed for each second in the difference of the record. No records slower than 2:15 will be considered, the natural supposition being that no owner would start a horse incapable of trotting a mile in that time. Therefore, the 2:15 trotter would start on the scratch and the 2:14 trotter would start is 0 feet behind him.

The most important work of the handicapping committee will be to watch the performances of the Derby candidates in their races in the early grand circuit meeting. If they are satisfied that a trotter with a record of 2:15 can trot a mile in 2:98 then the allowance of 50 feet for each second will be made. 
