Cambridge, Mass., May 16.—Speed and strength in the track events enabled Yale to defeat Harvard in the stadium in the annual dual games today by a score of 60 1-5 points to 54 4-5 points. The vic-tory also gave Yale permanent posses-sion of the trophy offered in 1901 the blue having defeated Harvard since that time on five occasions. Harvard won the first trophy in 1900. No records were broken, although Robbins of Yale ran the high hurdles in 15 1-5 seconds, a world's record, but the figures were not allowed by Referee Sullivan because there was a slight wind in the runner's favor.
