Glass reinforced with wire has been shown by the tests of the British fire pre-vention committee to be really of great advantage in resisting fire. Three open-ings were closed with wired glass, and fire was applied for 6 minutes, the tem-perature, reaching 50 degrees F., but not exceeding 150 degrees.
