

## OGDEN OCCURRENCES.

JANUARY 27.

JUDGE R. K. WILLIAMS has been missed from the District and Justice's Courts for a long time past. He is ill. He has been confined to his bed for several months, at times unable to eat scarcely anything, and what little he did take into his stomach he could not retain. His condition has been very critical, and he is far from convalescent now. He is dropsical and it is very probable that tapping will be resorted to.

SEVERAL of our city solons have taken a vacation. Alderman Eccles is in Oregon on business pertaining to his extensive lumber interests. He will be absent for some time yet. Councilor William Driver is combining business with pleasure, visiting the Golden State, and will not return "thence" for two weeks or more yet. Councilor John A. Boyle has gone to Colorado on business connected with the large furniture establishment of Boyle & Company.

TO-DAY, Deputy Marshal Whetstone and others made a quiet visit to the residence of Mr. Richard Douglass, three doors west of this department. They arrested Richard on the going charge. Subsequently Mrs. Eliza Douglass was subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury. Messrs. Geo. H. Tribe and John Smith gave security in \$1,500 for Richard, and \$300 for Eliza to appear when called for.

AT THE ELECTION held here last August Mr. James Pingree was elected County Treasurer for Weber County. To-day he qualified and entered upon his duties. His predecessor, Robert P. Harris, Esq., was released from responsibility in that regard, and his bondsman, Messrs. D. H. Peery, Lorin Farr, Dr. John D. Carnahan and Jos. Clark, Esq., were discharged from further obligation as sureties. Mr. Harris has served the county faithfully as treasurer. When his accounts were audited to-day, the debt and credit sides showed an exact balance. Every cent of the receipts had been accounted for, and Mr. Harris in retiring received a clean sheet.

THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR number fifteen in Ogden now, and last night a lodge was organized here. There were quite a number of visitors on the occasion. The officers of "the Ogden Lodge No. 2" just installed are: S. M. Preshaw, Chief Templar, Dr. F. A. Hall, Vice-Templar, C. P. Jennings, Secretary, George F. Brown, Treasurer, M. Minion, Financial Treasurer. The meetings of the order are held in the large, upper room of Peery's Hall, Fourth street, which has been handsomely fitted up and appointed for the purpose.

THE ICEMEN'S harvest seems to have come at last, and they are now busy gathering in the congealed water to their coolers to be preserved for necessary purposes during the heated term this year.

TO-DAY THE WEATHER has been the coldest we have experienced for the season thus far. The wind blew fiercely from the north for some time, and then veered a little to the northwest and continued all the day. The streets are now dry and hard as adamant, and pedestrians on the roads appeared in heavy ulsters, furs, and skins, etc.

A LITTLE MUSS was created in the justices' court this morning when Mrs. Richard Flint appeared for judgment for the assault committed on Mrs. John Fowler. His honor assessed a fine of \$12 against her. She demurred to the judgment. She said, with some vigor, she was not around paying fines for nothing. She appealed her case to the District Court.

She leaves a husband and eight children, only three of the latter being in this country. She was a faithful Latter-day Saint.
