**Change.**—The lecture by Elder William Willes, announced for Friday night in the 10th Ward School-house, will take place this evening instead. The public are invited.

The event takes place on Friday evening in the 16th Ward School-house, and like all parties in that excellent hall, will be a most pleasant affair. **Lecture.**—Yesterday evening, there was a large attendance at the Fourth Ward School-house, where the Y. M. M. L. A. listened, with attention and delight, to a lecture from Elder William Willes on the "Science of Communication," with anecdotes illustrative thereof, which embraced nearly all the means and modes possessed by men and animals from the time when it was said, "Let there be light," to the introduction of the telephone.

**Jail Breaking.**—Our Brigham City correspondent A. C. writes as follows, under date of March 12:

"Yesterday, Robert McCue and Wm. Esterline, who were confined in the County Jail awaiting the action of the grand jury upon a charge of house breaking, broke the outer door of the jail off from the iron connecting it with the hinges by taking off the bolts fastening the iron to the door. They had planned their escape for a number of weeks, they are old jail birds. No trace of them has been discovered by the officers, who are hunting for them."

**Fraughtworthy.**—Yesterday we had a pleasant call from Bishop Eli Whitaker of Milton, Morgan County. He had just settled the emigration account of Hans Christian Madsen of his ward, who is 75 years of age and a cripple unable to work. By raising a little stock Bro. Madsen has been able to sustain himself and pay up his emigration debt—\$75, and this offers an excellent example to younger and more vigorous men and women who are still owing the P. E. Fund for their deliverance from "Babylon."

**Fourteenth Ward.**—Elder Jos. F. Smith was announced to lecture in the 14th Ward Assembly Rooms last evening, and as usual, where he speaks, the house was filled. It then became known that through illness, the speaker would not be able to attend, and President Taylor occupied the time in an interesting lecture upon the early history of Joseph Smith's life. The speaker stated that he came merely to listen and had therefore no preparations to lecture on the above subject.

**Children's Performance.**—The entertainment given last evening by the Primary Mutual Improvement Association of the 11th Ward, was a splendid success, the young folks acquitting themselves in a manner far beyond their years. The various songs, recitations and dialogues were well rendered, and the closing acting drama "Matrimony" was unique and pleasing to the highest degree, reminding one of the performances given by Gen. Tom Thumb and his company.

At the close of the entertainment a vote of thanks was tendered to Sister Louise Felt, president, and her counselors, Elizabeth Felt and Louie Morris, who appeared upon the stage, when they were each presented with a beautiful group of hair flowers under a glass shade, which were made with hair taken from the heads of the members of the Primary M. I. A.

**Third District Court.**—Proceedings in the Third District Court, yesterday, M. Schaeffer, Chief Justice presiding.

The people, etc., vs. George W. Beck; jury trial; defendant confessed having committed assault and battery, and jury find accordingly.

People, etc., vs. John Bogan; convicted of assault and battery; defendant comes up and is sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and costs taxed at \$91.53, to be paid within six months, in default of which he is to be imprisoned.

The people, etc., vs. George A. Hendricks, et al.; grand larceny; jury trial; jury charged and return a verdict of not guilty. John Campbell vs. E. Randall, et al.; order confirming sale of real estate under decree herein. Court adjourned till this morning at 9.30 o'clock.

**Last Night's Meeting.**—The meeting of those interested in the movement to induce the investment of capital in this Territory was held last evening in the Federal Court Room.

The following resolution was presented, and carried:  
Whereas, It was the intention of the originators of this movement to organize for Utah an institution to be composed of the principal business men of the Territory, for the sole purpose of advertising the various interests and of our Territory, in some suitable and agreeable manner;  
Whereas, The persons becoming members of this organization are expected, as in all other institutions of a similar character, to differ religiously and politically, and discussions are liable to arise, which will have a tendency to defeat the objects of the association, therefore,  
Resolved, That this meeting proceed at once to organize a bureau of information for Utah Territory, agreeable to the plan proposed by the original movers thereof, and that the subjects of religion, politics, or any of the local questions in controversy here shall never be mentioned or discussed at this or any subsequent meeting.

Mr. H. W. Lawrence, the chairman of the committee appointed at the last meeting, stated that they had been unable to make a report, and also presented resolutions prepared by Mr. James, which were also adopted:  
This association is formed for the purpose of examining, discussing, advertising and developing the resources of the Territory of Utah, and shall be known as "The Utah Board of Trade," and shall be governed by the following articles:  
Article I.—The officers shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary and treasurer, and a board of directors consisting of seven members.  
Article II.—Any person twenty-one years of age may become a member of this association by signing the articles of the association and paying to the treasurer one dollar.

Article III.—The duties of the officers of this association shall be such as usually pertain to such officers, but they shall have no authority to bind or tender any member personally liable.  
Article IV.—No political, religious or sectarian subject shall be discussed at any of the meetings or inserted in any printed matter or correspondence issued by this Association.  
Article V.—The Association shall have power to pass, by a three-fourths vote of the members, such by-laws as the board of directors may propose, not inconsistent with these articles of association.  
Article VI.—The annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held on the second Wednesday of March of each year, and such other meeting as the president or board of directors may direct.  
Article VII.—The board of directors are authorized to appoint committees for carrying out the provisions and purposes of this Association.

After the adoption of these articles, those desirous of joining the organization reported their names, and it was decided to adjourn the meeting for one week. A committee of three consisting of Messrs. Sells, James and J. T. Little was appointed to invite the aid of business men throughout the city.

**St. George.**—"Amram," a St. George correspondent, writes the particulars of a journey made by him, in company with two other gentlemen, to the settlements on the Rio Virgin River, to meet with the people in the various towns. He describes the grand scenery of the country through which he passed, which is, indeed, pronounced by travelers, competent to judge, equal for rugged outline and primitive wildness to any in the world. In his travels, "Amram" found the people active in performing their duties and willing and thankful to receive instruction.

New buildings are being constructed in St. George to accommodate the wants of that growing community. The bridge across the Virgin is not yet completed, but the people expect to have it ready for the heavy tread of the "iron horse." The health of the inhabitants is good, gardening is being attended to, the fruit and shade trees are putting forth their leaves, and all "nature seems to be enjoying the warm rays of a spring sun."

**American Exchange.**—We received a call yesterday from Mr. Henry F. Gillig, proprietor and founder of the American Exchange and Reading Rooms, near Charing Cross, London. This establishment is an intelligence office at which information can be gained of interest to American, and where the leading papers of this country are kept on file. Mr. Gillig is a keen, intelligent gentleman, continually on the look-out for information that is likely to be of interest to his patrons. He left last evening for San Francisco.
