London, Aug. 16 .- While dissatisfied with the failure of Russia to recognize s principle that she had no right to tak a neutral ship, even if carrying contraband, the British government fels it will gain little by pressing the point, especially as it regards the power of the Russian navy to harm merchantmen in the far east as having practicalb disapepared. Therefore the government will accept an indemnity, which it will regard as an admission of the corectness of the position assumed by Foreign Secy.
