

FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

Uncle Tom's Cabin next Tuesday night at the Theatre.

Meeting of the High Council to-night at 7 o'clock, at the Council House.

The comic calendar of the untamable Savage is creating considerable merriment.

The large amount of holiday advertising business encroaches somewhat upon our reading matter space. As soon as the crush is over we will resume.

Yesterday, at Park City, Richard Bailey, of the Ontario Mill, was on a drunken spree. He shot three at David Hoge, but only hit his hat. Bailey was locked up.

Brother Edward Stevenson has left the city for Sanpete and Millard Counties. The object of his trip is the organization of Bee Associations in some of the settlements.

Hay is very scarce in the Sawtooth and Galena country, Idaho. What little there is for sale in that section brings \$100 per ton, and will not doubt reach \$200 by spring.

Mr. S. P. Teasdel, of the Eagle House, has just shipped off his twenty-first car of dried fruit for the season. There is still another to go, which will probably be sent off next week.

The business of the Union Pacific road is now so great as to require an average of a train every three minutes. Everything on the enormous traffic of the road, and yet the supply of cars is inadequate.

Our wide awake produce dealers are still making wholesale shipments in the various directions, especially to the east. Thus today, two cars of barley and two of wheat were shipped to Denver, and one of four each to Grand Island and Cheyenne.—Ogden Herald.

The tower electric light process having proved impracticable in Ogden, it has been decided to illuminate the more central streets by eight separate lights located in the most eligible positions. The Electric Light Company has agreed to furnish the lights for \$175 per month.

Wm. H. Barry, a painter, 25 years old, fell through a skylight in the rear of the new Union Pacific shop at Omaha, about nine o'clock on Sunday morning, and was killed. The unfortunate young man was precipitated to the ground, a distance of about 25 feet, striking on his head. He lingered about 45 minutes after the accident.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Escaped Convict.—Last night John Golding, an escaped convict from Idaho, was arrested in one of saloons in this city. He was placed in the city jail for temporary safe keeping, and will shortly be returned to the place from whence he came.

A Thing of Beauty.—F. Auerbach and Bro. have holiday windows that are not easily excelled in beauty of arrangement. The articles presented are mostly of the classes of goods suitable for gifts, and are of a superior kind. The display attracts numerous passers by.

Gamblers Arrested.—The police made a raid last night on a gambling house and arrested the proprietor and 18 others who were engaged in gaming. The proprietor was fined \$50, and 17 of the others \$25 apiece, one being discharged. The fines were paid.

Petty Theft.—This morning, F. Hoffman, a tramp, was before Justice Pryor on a charge of stealing an overcoat and blankets belonging to an employee of Mr. Charles Popper, from the latter's premises. Hoffman confessed to having committed the theft and was fined \$50. There are other charges against Hoffman yet to be preferred.

Beautify the Home.—It is an error to suppose that money expended in improving a home is thrown away. It is doubtful whether there is any more direct way of increasing its pecuniary value. Certainly its market value will depend very much upon its outward appearance. A tasteful and well-painted building, well-arranged grounds, with a neat fence, shade trees properly disposed, will set off a residence to great advantage, and make an amazing difference when it comes to be sold. And if it be not sold, then these things will add wonderfully to the enjoyment of its possessor, if he be not blind to everything but the dollar.

A Hanging Jury.—The Plymox-Climax mining suit has been one of the longest on the legal record of Utah. The trial occupied nearly a month, and the jury appear to be unable to arrive at a verdict. The case was given to the jury at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, December 14th. Yesterday they appeared in court and asked for a statement of portions of the evidence. The Judge informed them that they were supposed to remember the testimony, and the instructions already given by the Court were sufficient. They then returned to their room.

This morning, the jury put in another appearance in court and stated they believed it was not possible for them to agree upon a verdict. The Court, however, refused to discharge them, and sent them back to their room for further deliberation.

Later—At 2 o'clock this afternoon the jury again appeared in court, and having failed to agree upon a verdict, were dismissed. The jury stood, on the first ballot, eight for the Plymox Company and four for the Climax Company. The evidence was gone over repeatedly, but the situation stood from the beginning to the close of the forty-seven hours' deliberation, the same. They were as immovable as the notable 8 to 7 of the historic high commission on the Tilden-Hayes presidential difficulty.

**A Novel Expedition.**—Drummers are now a recognized and established institution in Utah. They are a genial though persistent class of people, generally the essence of politeness. Some drummers are simply irresistible, and some merchants find it next to impossible to evade their persuasive ways, they are so nice and insinuating.

A shipload of drummers is about to be sent out from England and pre-empted upon the world. They will represent every kind of British manufactures. The design is to visit every seaport in the world where trading is done. The vessel will carry nothing but the drummers and their samples, and the time of the voyage will depend upon business.

Should this expedition be followed up by a shipload of book agents, and that by another of insurance men, the consequences might be quite serious.

**The Artesian Well.**—Yesterday morning, one of the employees of this office paid a visit to the artesian well, on the bench northeast of the city. He says it has reached a depth of 675 feet, and is progressing at the rate of about two feet per day. It is now below the level of the Great Salt Lake, and penetrating through a stratum of brown cement and gravel. The work is being conducted for the city by Mr. E. Bench. Progress has been considerably delayed for some time past in consequence of the loose formations, and the large boulders met with, which have prevented the iron piping from following down to the depth increased. This difficulty is now removed, as the piping rests upon a body of hard cement, and the boring is progressing without the aid of the pipe.

**A Serio-Comic Opera.**—The members of the Eleventh Ward Choir, assisted by the well known local leader, under the direction of their teacher, Brother H. A. Tuckett, have prepared, and will present in the 11th Ward School House, on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, Dec. 21st and 22nd, the original serio-comic opera, by Evan Stephens, entitled "The May Queen." It contains some of his best compositions in the musical line. The orchestral music will be under the direction of "Prof. E. Beesley. The proceeds will be devoted to the benefit of the Ward choir and Sunday School. Doors open at 7.30, the performance will commence at 8 o'clock.

**Shooting Scrape.**—The Ogden Herald of yesterday contains the following:

"About 7 o'clock, last night, Mr. Wm. Stunder left his place of business in the Y to return to his home on Franklin Street. He went up Fifth Street as far as the Shamrock saloon, when he turned south, a short distance. F. H. Thompson sprang up from beneath a fence and with an objectionable expletive presented a pistol at Stunder's breast. Stunder struck the weapon, causing it to point upward, when it was discharged. Stunder then jumped several feet and fell on the ground, when Thompson fired a second shot which passed over the body of Stunder without hitting him. Thompson afterwards gave himself up to the sheriff.

The side of his head and his ear were cut open. A surgeon was called, who sewed up the ugly gashes, and the patient was apparently doing favorably. Some fears were entertained, however, by the attending physician, that concussion of the brain might ensue.

DAVIS STAKE CONFERENCE.

The quarterly Conference of Davis Stake was held at East Bountiful Ward, Dec. 10th and 11th, at 10 a.m.

There were present on the stand: Of the Apostles, John Henry Smith; the State Presidency, Bishops, and members of the High Council.

The statistical reports were read, after which some of the Bishops gave verbal reports of their wards. President W. R. Smith wished the men holding the Priesthood to take an interest in political matters and prize the liberty which God has given us.

In the afternoon, the Bishops finished giving their reports. They presented the people living in the stake and the majority paying their tithes and offerings.

Apostle John Henry Smith expressed himself as being pleased with the reports of the wards. Parents should be careful to set good examples before their children. As a mother, also, will her daughters be a mother to the world. Parents should have a faith that will influence their whole lives. We should reach out in all directions after truth.

President J. F. Smith, Voting as we do to sustain in respect to the able positions is an important matter. A majority have never left the Church, so we are safe in following the majority. The combinations against us should not worry us at all.
