UTAH'S NEW CHIEF JUSTICE.

THE following from the Baltimore
Sun, is very severe upon the new
Chief Justice for this Territory,
whether justly or unjustly we are
not in a situation to determine, but
we hope for the best—

"Alabama vs. Utah.—As has been
announced, President Grant has
conferred the appointment of asso-
ciate justice for the Territory of
Utah upon Alexander White of
Alabama. White was a member of
the last Congress, and rendered
himself conspicuous by his advocacy
of the iniquitous partisan force
bill, of which he was the reputed
author. He is a native Alabamian
and a man of considerable ability,
but his action on this bill and in
other respects seems to have lost
him caste in Alabama, rendering
him anxious, it is said, to go where
things may prove more congenial.
The people of Alabama will prob-
ably consider that the President
has done them a favor in making
this appointment. What Alabama
loses Utah gains."

Sudden Death—Fatal Accident.

OGDEN CITY, Utah,
Oct. 2, 1875.

Editor Deseret News:

The weather here for some time
past has been very good indeed. It
is now getting a little cooler and
pleasanter, day by day. Business
seems brisker and traders seem
cheerful.

This morning John Leavitt, aged
about 21, son of Nathaniel Leavitt,
of this place, died rather suddenly.
Last night, near midnight, John
L. Moore, brakeman on the U. P.
R. R., was switching in the yard of
the depot, and while passing along
on some flat coal cars, stepping
from one to another in discharge
of his duty, made a misstep and fell
between two of the cars, striking on
the railing, where he hung sus-
pended and dragged for several
rods and finally fell on the track,
where he was soon after discovered
by one of the employees. After he
was discovered he spoke once and
spit once and soon after expired.
Dr. Condon was summoned imme-
diately, but when he arrived the
life of John L. Moore was extinct.
An examination of the body showed
that although it was bruised
considerably no bones were broken.
Deceased was about 26 years of age.
He was well respected and leaves a
young wife and many friends to
mourn his loss. Funeral takes
place to-morrow, Sunday p. m.

Breadful and Fatal Accident.

SPRINGVILLE, October 3, 1875.

Editor Deseret News:

A deplorable accident transpired
last evening at 10.30, at A. Noe's
molasses mill, in this city. The
mill had stopped a little time to
repair, and the water was not turned
off, consequently was running at
good speed. John Marchbanks, the
feeder, son of James and Mary Ann
Marchbanks, of Southampton, Eng-
land, it is supposed, had been clean-
ing out the leaves below the cogs
and coupling shaft, and was caught
in the cogs by his clothes and torn
through and went once round at
least and landed where he started.
His life was gone. He must have
been killed as quick as he was
struck. No person saw him until
the crash was heard. Then they

saw him revolving. His body was
fearfully mangled. One arm was
torn from his body, and one leg was
broken and torn in a terrible man-
ner. He was about 20 years of age,
a smart, promising young man.

A coroner's inquest has been held.
No person was to blame. The oc-
currence has caused sorrow and
mourning to many a heart, and all
feel to sympathize with his parents
and family. The funeral is to be
