THE SKIPPERS. The skikppers look like moths; they all have a hook on the end of the clubbed antennae, and are strong, quick fliers. They are hard to catch, but the larvae of one species may be found on the roots of the yucca. The caterpiller has a hammer-shaped head, a thin neck and a body tapering from the middle to each end. It may always be known by this characteristic form. Some of those we have here feed on the locust trees. THE SWALLOW TAILS

The swallow tails may be known by the long tails on the hind wings. They are our largest species, usually black, marked with yellow, green or blue. In our mountains is a white kind without tails.
