## DEATH OF W. S. LEWIS, JR.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Dec. 9.--William Staines Lewis, Jr., died from typhoid fever in this city yesterday afternoon at 1 p. m., after four weeks' severe ill-ness. Brother Lewis would have been 21 years of age on the 2nd of January next. He descended from good Puritan stock, his lineage reaching direct to William Lewis, who came to America in the Mayflower. His father and mother reside at Kanab, where the de-ceased was born; they were present at his death bed, having come to comfort him and minister to him in his illness. Brother Lewis came to the Brigham Young academy as a student three years ago. He had remarkable talent for music; two years of plane study placed him among the foremost players nd accompanists of Utah. His genial, intelligent face and kindly nature com-mended him to all, and his noble heart was accorded in turn the warmest friendship and truest loves. His association with the Provo tabernacle choir made him generally known, and his parents have the sincerest sympathy from the whole public. During the pres-ent year Brother Lewis taught music in the Brigham Young academy, and was very successful with a large number of devoted students. Rarely is talent, in-dustry and ambition found so proportionately united in one life, as were they in the departed, and, but for his seemingly untimely death, he would have reached a front rank among his fellows.
