Perchance the judgments of God must go to the nations and destroy untold thousands, and after that the Elders will be sent back; and I believe that so long as time shall last, or eternity it-elf endure, there will be need of quorums of Seventies to carry the Gospel of salvation to the children of men. Even after the resurrection the faithful shall find their abode in the Celestial Kingdom, there will be occasion to minister to those of a terrestrial order; aud those of a terrestrial order will carry the Gospel to those of a telestial or-der; and as eternity shall roll on will we seventies be required to labor in the ministry. We should give more of our time to spiritual affairs and intellectual culture, that we may cope with the world in learning. These things should be taught in the **fheological** classes organized amoug the Seventies for the purpose of training them in the science of theology, history, etc. Never waste your time in the discussion of unprofitable subjects, but deal only with those that shall mike you pol-ished shafts in the hands of God to

worthily bear his priesthood. Presidents George Reynolds and 8. B. Young, in addition to what Brother Roberts had explained, said that the labors of the Seventies at home should he to minister in the eapacity of teaching, visiting the Saints, working in the Sunday Schools or wherever their labors might be needed.

postle John Henry Smith spoke of the power of example upon the young, the necessity of throwing a young, the necessity of throwing a protecting influence over them and guiding the wayward and reckless by acts of kindness and personally laboring with them, mingling with them and dropping kind words of admonition to them. He spoke of young men who had come years afterwards and thanked him for the good couusel he had given them, and which had made them better meu. He bore testimouy to the divine mission of the Prophet Joseph Smith and the important ministry of the Seventies, and spoke of the responsibility resting upon all who have named the name of Jesus. Condemnation is resting upon High Priests, Presi-dents of Stakes, and all others who violate the words of wisdom, for in so doing they were responsible to a great extent for the shortcomings of others. Those who preside leave an impress for good or evil among their flocks and those with whom they associate. The Priesthood, if lived up to will will exalt us in our Father's Kingdom. It is the gem of gems, the priceless jewel of everlasting life.

President Roberts desired that each quorum find out how many vacancies there were in its council and membership and to select names from the Elders' quorums by and with the consent of the Presi-dency of the Stake and presidents of the Elders's quorums, as per the circular issued some time ago, and report to the general secretary, and some of the council would meet with and complete their organizations.

Brother Roberts, in behalf of the first council and conference generally, thanked the authorities of the Stake for the use of the Assembly Hall, and the congregatiou endorsed the sentiment by unanimous vote.
