BROTHER CANNON.
Dear Sir:—We have just heard of the death of Father Ezra Carter of Scarborough, Maine. He was the father of Mrs. Sarah B. Foss and Mrs. Phoebe W. Woodruff. He was born in Concord, New Hampshire, on the 18th of March, 1772, and died in Scarborough, Maine, March 10, 1868, lacking only 8 days of being 96 years of age. He was a very temperate man in all of his habits of life. His house has been a welcome home to all the elders of Israel who have ever visited his neighborhood since the organization of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He visited me and my family at Cambridgeport, and on the 22nd day of March, 1849, I baptized him into the New and Everlasting Covenant and ordained him a High Priest. He lived a Saint and came to his grave like a stock of corn fully ripe. His examples in life were worthy of imitation. He died in the Lord and awaits a glorious resurrection.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday afternoon a fierce rain-storm began to rage and continued for some time. After a slight cessation, snow began to fall, and this morning there was a deposit of about half a foot deep, of which the most has already melted, under a mild thaw and a gentle rain.

Manti; cloudy but mild; two inches of snow, and the appearance of more.

Chicken Creek; snowing slightly; warm; wind blowing from the south.

Scipio; snowed an inch last night; very cold. Fillmore; snowed last night about four inches. Cove Creek; very stormy; five inches of snow, but thawing fast.

Beaver; snowed about two inches last night; pleasant and warm this morning; still cloudy and threatening a storm.

Parowan; cloudy and cold; wind blowing quite hard.

Cedar City; about two inches of snow fell last night; clearing off now.

St. George; yesterday was a very stormy day. It rained most of the day with a high wind. Clear and pleasant to-day. Thermometer, 62.

TRIAL OF A CHINESE MURDERER.—A Chinaman named How Jung killed a brother Chinaman in Montana, and was put upon his trial for murder by the "barbarian" authorities of that Territory. The ceremony of swearing Chinese witnesses has some points of a novel character about it, of which the subjoined extract from the Helena Herald will give a fair understanding:—

Ah Lee was interpreter for the prosecution, and Sam Wah for the defence. The ceremony of swearing the witnesses and interpreters was a curious one, inasmuch as it was conducted, as far as possible, in the Chinese fashion. A copy of the usual oath to "tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth," as the case might be, was written in Chinese and presented to each of the persons to be sworn, each one at the same time putting a piece of red paper, about four inches square, into his pocket. Two roosters, which had been in "attendance upon Court" for nearly two days in order that they might be ready for this ceremony, were now brought in front of the Judge's seat, in order that, through their merriment in the cause of justice, they might influence the Celestials to tell the truth. Rooster No. 1, how had his head laid across a block of wood, beside which stood witness No. 1. A hatchet being handed to him, the Celestial, not the rooster, he struck a blow upon the neck of the poultry specimen, and witness No. 2 and 3 followed suit, the third blow dispatching the fowl. Rooster No. 2 was similarly served by the interpreters and remaining witness. While the fowls were still bleeding and their blood being caught in a plate, the persons being sworn stood up before the Clerk of the Court and burned the oaths to which they had subscribed, at the same time taking upon themselves the following Chinese substitute for an oath: "If I do not tell the truth I shall die as the chicken dies; but if I do tell the truth I shall go home to China in a short time." The swearing of the witnesses and interpreters being thus concluded, the examination commenced, the Court room being filled with a mixed assemblage of curious whites and half a hundred Chinamen. We presume the full proceedings will be duly reported in the Pekin Observer, and who knows, should the prisoner be hung, but that the Celestial Organ referred to will make a great talk over an "outrage on a Chinese citizen." The Nation Insulted, etc., as the New York Herald ever did over George Francis Train.

It is thought that the examination of witnesses will be concluded this afternoon, and that a verdict will be rendered to-night or to-morrow.
