NEW WELDING SCHEME.

Street Railway Company Uses it in Laying New Rails.

The Utah Light & Railway company began this morning laying the heavy new rails on east South Temple street, and welding the rail joints by a process entirely new in this part of the

world, but which proves to be just the thing wanted and needed here in street railway construction. It is known as the Thermit welding by the Gold-schmidt process, and by it all the fish bars are done away with, and the coatbars are cone away with, and the coat-ly copper bonding to ensure electrical conductivity for the return current is rendered unnecessary. The scheme of operation includes a

The scheme of operation includes a moveable and perfectly light crucible set over and enclosing the ends of the rails to be welded, and into this cruci-ble is placed the welding agent con-sisting of oxide of iron, mixed with finely divided aluminum. The crucible is specially lined so as to stand the fierce heat of 5,500 degrees F., and when the fusing powder, one of the salts of barium, is placed on the mixture and ignited, the welding mixture takes fire and the chemical action imediately proand the chemical action imediately pro-duces the degree of heat mentioned. The aluminum takes up the oxygen The aluminum takes up the exygen from the iron, leaving pure iron as a by-product. The latter, after the re-action, on account of its greater speci-fic gravity, separates from the slag, and elnks to the bottom of the crucible, and the slag being lighter, floats or top. The latter material is corundum mercial value and is used on polishing machines. After the siag and from are separated, the crucible is tapped from the bottom, and the molten iron flows into moulds placed to receive it around the rail ends. Within a few sec-onds, or as soon as the iron solidifies,

Supervisor's Report Shows What is Being Done by that Department.

According to the report of Street Supervisor Seddon for the month of April, the total expenses of the street and irrigation departments of the city for the month was \$6,390.74. The strest sprinkling department cost the city \$815 during the month. During the month there were 10 stone cross waks put in; 108 flumes built; 10 flumes repaired; 28 bridges repaired.
