WESTERN MARKET LETTER

Special Correspondence, Kausas City, Mo., Monday, April 27.-Cattle receipts at Kansas City last wee amounted to 26,085 head, as against 22.87 Cattle receipts at Kansas City last week amounted to 25,085 head, as against 22,510 head the corresponding week iast year. The run was 5,009 less than previous week, and the decrease was mostly fat steers. Consequently fed steers sold strong and higher every day and gained 25 cents dur-ing the week. Cows sold quieity all week, and closed a shade higher. Bolls sold well and maintained gain of previous week. Stockers and feeders made an average loss of 20 cents for the week, although choice kinds were no lower, and sold al-most as high as fat steers, as best stock-ers brought 55,20, while top beef was at \$5.30. Western fat steers sold up to \$1.55, on Thursday, with numerous sales above \$4.69. Western heifers brought from \$3.55 to \$4.45. Veal culves lost 50 cents last week, and bring around \$5.56 for best. The run today is 7,009 head of cuttle, a gain of 2,000 over a week ago. Eastern markets report a big run and lower prices. The first sales today were on a steady basis, but later bids were from weak to ble lower. A liberal supply of beef steers is on the market. Stockers and feders are selling steady with last week's close. The supply of cows is moderate, and the good kinds are steady, others closing weak. Indications favor a liberal supply of cattle for current week. Sheer steers at Kansas City last week were 52.842 head as compared with 15.16 head corresponding week last year. West-ern lambs were scarce and opened the week is cents higher. Bulk of run last week were southerin grass muitons, conweek 15 cents higher. Bulk of run has week were southern grass muttons, con-taining no humbs, and Colorado and west-ern shippers had no southern competition in lambs. The result was that sheep sold lower every day, and lambs gained ground. The run today is fair at 6,000 head, and lambs are steady.
