## WALKER TRIAL NEARING THE END

Testimony of Both Sides All In—  
Arguments Being Made  
Today.

## SUIT TO ENJOIN OGDEN CITY

From Filling in Old Channel of River  
—Young Couple Disappointed  
—Wedding Bells.

Ogden, Dec. 19.—The court, jury, attorneys and all connected with the case of the state against Fred C. Walker, are glad that it is nearing an end. For over two weeks the great labor of getting a jury and placing before them the evidence in the case has been in progress, and all connected with it began to show evidences of the great strain it has occasioned.

A little after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the defense completed its rebuttal testimony and an adjournment was taken until this morning when the arguments were commenced by Judge Corn for the prosecution. He will be followed in the arguments by attorneys Horn and Hutchinson for the defendant. They may occupy the entire afternoon, if so the final argument to the jury will be made Friday morning by Dist. Atty. Halverson. Judge Magnus it is understood will not be heard in the arguments. Judge Howell stated that it will require fully an hour to read his instructions to the jury. The defense presented to the court 48 requests to be embodied in the instructions.

On the convening of court yesterday afternoon Sheriff Sebring made an official return in the writ of attachment issued for Russell Harrison, the night clerk at the European hotel. The sheriff in reply to questions from the court stated that he had been unable to locate Harrison anywhere in the state. On that showing the subpoena and writ were resolved in evidence. The testimony of Harrison at the preliminary hearing was read to the jury. It was to the effect that Dr. Beers and Mrs. Walker registered at the European hotel as W. W. Wallace and wife and occupied a room together one night. The defense then rested.

The state recalled Mrs. Nagle, who in answer to questions from Judge Magnus, stated that she did not remember of either her or Mrs. Walker saying to the clerk when they registered Sept. 9, that as they would only stay the rooms a short time, they should not be charged so much. While at the rooms Dr. Beers and Dr. Dalley called, but stayed only a short time. Dr. Beers said he wanted to speak with Mrs. Walker and they went out of the room. Dr. Dalley said to witness: "Why ain't you jolly and so-

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able," and she replied, "Because I don't have to be, that's the reason." Witness said she was angry at Mrs. Walker for having the doctors come to their rooms, as she did not want to be seen with any gentlemen. She left Mrs. Walker at the room crying.

Parley Draney, clerk of the Healy, testified to Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Nagle registering at the Healy on Sept. 9. That they were visited by Beers and Dalley and when the two gentlemen left they ordered beer and sandwiches sent to the rooms.

Chief of Police Browning testified that he had a conversation with Mr. Lawrence after the fight between Walker and Beers, in which he told him chief he took the wrench away from Beers and gave him a push.

Sheriff Sebring and Deputy Sheriff Ritchie were placed on the witness stand and testified that they had examined the Electric Supply and Fixture company's building and that they could hear each other call when one was in the front room upstairs, and the other one was downstairs. Also that from the upstairs rear door by bending over a little the face of any person could be discerned in the mirror over the washstand. Which testimony corroborated that given by Mrs. Hall and her daughter that they heard the screams and saw some of the fighting.

This completed the rebuttal, and as it was too late to commence the arguments, an adjournment was taken until this morning.

**SUIT AGAINST CITY ET AL.**  
To Enjoin Them From Filling in Old Channel of Ogden River.

Ogden, Dec. 19.—Judge Howell has set down for hearing on Dec. 23, the case of the Ogden Milling and Elevator company et al. against Ogden City and the Wheelwright Construction company. This is the suit to determine whether or not Ogden City has the legal right to close up and fill in the old channel of the Ogden river near the mouth of Ogden canyon for which the city has let contract to the Wheelwright Construction company. The plaintiffs are a number of those most interested in taking water from the old channel of the river both for irrigation and power purposes. A temporary restraining order was entered by Judge Howell at the time of filing the suit and the hearing set for the 23rd is to determine whether or not the injunction shall be made permanent or not. While the plaintiffs in the suit are perhaps the most interested in the outcome of the suit, the public in general also have considerable interest in it.

The clerk on examining the mother's consent, found that the most important part of it had been forgotten, the signature, and therefore the marriage will have to be postponed until the paper can be sent to Carleton and signed, which will take about three days. The disappointment of the happy young couple can be imagined, and they are beginning to think that "True Love never runs smooth."

This action has been taken with a view to protect the public as several of the toy pistols are of such a character as to permit the use of blank .22 caliber shells and the use of fine shot, the same being dropped into the barrel, making the instrument dangerous in the hands of a thoughtless boy.
