# MEDICAL AUTHORITIES INVESTIGATE HOCH CASE

Chicago, Jan. 25 .- Medical authorities have been called to ald the police in determining whether an insidious polson could have produced nephritis, to which all but one of the six dead wives of "Bluebeard" Johann Hoch succumbed.

According to certificates signed by attending physicians, all of the women whom Hoch is alleged to have mur-dared, died of this complaint, except Mrs. Mary Steinbecker. Her case was diagnosed as gastritis or inflammation of the stomach. Physicians already con-sulted give the opinion that arsenic rulght cause death in such a manner with those of nephritis.
